

"Most of our customers come in because they got interested in the state quarters," Kann said. "There are 35 quarters out so far and the program runs through 2008. We have nice albums that organize them and show a little plece of history."

Another new series capturing attention are Lewis and Clark nickels, produced to commemorate the 200th an-niversary of the team's trek across the country. A set of 10 coins is \$11.95, and each coin

is marked with the symbols of both the Philadelphia and Denver mints.

Coins, stamps and their paraphernalia are big holiday gifts, Kannsald. For young col-lectors, pick up a \$2,99 book to get them started with pennies. More detailed coin albums, as well as coin frames, boxes and wooden chests, can range from \$33 to \$80.

A 2005 pure silver American dollar, with Liberty on the front and an eagle on the back, is \$15.95. Boxed sets of 1-ounce silver coins that mark Baby's First Christmas are \$19.95.

Those with fond memories of a picule or laser show at Stone Mountain may go for a 1925 silver dollar (\$115) that was produced to raise funds to complete the mountain's carying. The coin was issued as legal tender. It sold for \$1 — 50 cents went to complete the carving and the other 50 cents was what the coin was actually worth.

The shop's unusual stamps include bicentennial souvenirs as well as an assortment of fa-
