

Mayor John Lawson said that a letter from the pastor, the Rev. Bill Young, had asked the city to include its property in the city limits.



Back in 1939 that was a challenge to a young Baptist minister, the Rev. W. Arnold Smith, who was determined to build one

Avondale was a planned city — each lot was designated by developer George Willis as a home, a part of the English village, or for recreation or even a dairy.

No locations had been marked for a church or a school, early settlers recall.

Members of the church which resulted from that young minister's determination — First Baptist, Avondale Estates, which is located at Stratford Road and Covington Highway, Friday dedicated a new sanctuary and raised its steeple. They are now planning a \$250,000 family life center.

fathers met, we were there asking for our church," said Ms. Lallerstedt. "The city did not oppose it, but didn't have the power to do anything. They couldn't change the charter except every 20 years, or some period like that."

When the church bought land, the city required that everyone in a mile of the proposed church be polled, and some objected to it, the historian recalled.

Construction began anyway, with members of the congregation doing much of the work. The "faint of heart" had already left the group, she said.

Ms. Lallerstedt was a student at Agnes Scott College in the planning days. She later taught at Avondale Elementary.


The church then faced World War II, when the men went off to war, and building materials were scarce. There were benefits though, Ms. Lallerstedt recalled, as gas rationing prompted citizens of the area to attend the local

The city was represented at the steeple-raising ceremoney by Dewey Brown, city manager, and its policemen spent the morning assisting with traffic.




