As souls were won for Jesus via door-to-door evangelism, home bible classes, vacation bible school, good news clubs and ministries in housing projects throughout Atlanta, the fellowship grew. What was once a handful of believers was now a congregation, and the meeting was no longer the Mcneal's living room but the chapel of Carver Bible College.

Atlanta Bible Baptist Church was chartered in October 1966 with Dr. John A. McNeal as pastor. The beliefs and practices were the same as that of the General Association of Regular Baptist Churches. This independent Baptist church began to support missionaries, and, in 1969, started two bus routes to expand its outreach. Two years later, it joined the fundamental Baptist Fellowship Association.

Many members and years later, the Lord guided in the purchase of a church building. On the first Sunday of April 1973, the congregation marched jubilantly into the edifice at 2957 Glenwood Rd. The church continues to proclaim God's word through various ministries including a prison ministry, nursing home ministry, single adults, teen, bus, scouting and other evangelistic outreach ministries.

Atlanta Bible Church is now located at 1663 Bouldercrest Rd., and the membership continues to grow in numbers and spiritually through consistent expository preaching and teaching of the word of God.

The church supports more than 18 missionaries at home and abroad and eight new congregations have grown out of this fellowship located in Georgia, Florida, Tennessee and Louisiana.

Amid protests, rioting and demands for improved conditions in the impoverished neighborhood, this handful of believers spread the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ with the hope of substituting "sin power" with "Christ's power."
