Once upon a time, in the great metropolitan area of Atlanta, there was no Wesleyan Church. Sometime between the years 1915 and 1920, Mr. Charles L. Eppley, a layman in the North Carolina Conference, along with his wife and six children, moved to Atlanta. In 1923, he invited the Rev. J. M. Hames, a general evangelist, whom he had known in North Carolina, to come to Atlanta and hold a tent meeting. In July of that year, a large tent was set up on the southeast corner of Woodward and Loomis Avenues. Rev. Hames is quoted as saying, "God put his seal on the first service. The crowds came; conviction settled down; revival fire began to spread; and souls prayed through to victory.

During that meeting, several Wesleyan Methodists living in Atlanta, along with a number of other Christians, expressed a desire to organize a Wesleyan Methodist Church. On Sunday morning, July 15, 1923, at the close of the revival, 17 people came forward for membership; and the First Wesleyan Methodist Church of Atlanta was organized.

The charter members were: Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Eppley, Miss Stella Eppley, Miss Cora Eppley, Miss Juanita Eppley, Mr. Ralph Eppley, Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Jones, Miss Evie A. Jones, Miss Carrie Jones, Miss Mary Jones, Mrs. George A. Caldwell, Mrs. Eura D. Howard, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Austin, and Mrs. S. N. House.

A committee was appointed to locate a building site for the church. A vacant corner lot at Woodward and Park Avenues was subsequently purchased. On February 15, 1924, 75 feet of the lot was sold to a Mr. Willingham for \$800, which was the original purchase price of the entire lot.

Soon a plain, tabernacle-type, frame building (approximately 32 x 48 feet) was erected on that corner with salvaged lumber from old Camp Gordon (which was being demolished at that time). This building served as sanctuary, Sunday school, and parsonage.

Rev. John Ernest was appointed to serve as the first pastor of the church, and Mr. C. L. Eppley was the first Sunday School Superintendent.

In May 1944, Pastor Davis resigned to accept an appointment as Chaplain of the Georgia State Prison at Reidsville, the church membership at that time was 40, with an average Sunday school attendance of 65, and the church property was valued at approximately \$9,000.

In 1948, during the pastorate of Rev. Raymond R. Hicks, a brick parsonage was built on Atlanta Avenue; and in 1953 a Sunday School Annex was added to the stone building. Once again, we found that Mr. Caleb Gunby had cut timbers to build himself a new house, but chose instead to donate the lumber to be used in building the parsonage.

A nursery was added in 1961, under the pastorate of Rev. N. C. Hoggle.

In June 1968, the Wesleyan Methodist Church was merged with the Pilgrim Holiness Church, and the name was changed to The Wesleyan Church.

In January 1969, under the pastorate of Rev. John A. Giles, the parsonage on Atlanta Avenue was sold for \$16,750; and in March of that year, a 3-bedroom, 2-bath, brick parsonage and 14 beautiful acres of land, which included a large lake, was purchased on Bouldercrest Road, in Ellenwood, Georgia, for a total price of \$75,000. Rev. and Mrs. Giles were able to move into the new parsonage soon after the purchase.

In April 1971, under the pastorate of Rev. James C. Meaders, the sanctuary and educational building on Park and Woodward Avenues were sold for approximately \$50,000. The last service in that church was on Easter Sunday of that year. The congregation worshipped in the Bouldercrest School on Sundays and in the Ellenwood Civic Center building on Wednesdays until the new church was completed.

The ground-breaking service for the new church was held on October 17, 1971, and the first service in the new church was on Sunday, September 23, 1973. The official dedication service was conducted on November 21, 1973, with General Superintendent Dr. Melvin Snyder officiating.

The total cost of the new parsonage and church building was approximately \$225,000; and a loan was secured from the Wesleyan Investment Foundation for \$72,000, which was the total indebtedness at that time.

Immediately after moving into the new building, the church had great and numerous problems. Many left the church for various reasons, resulting, of course, in a decrease in membership and income. However, by the Lord's blessings and help, the church was able to endure the hardships and to overcome.

In 1978, when Rev. L. E. Galyon accepted the pastorate, the indebtedness was approximately \$52,000. In September 1979, a debt-liquidation drive was initiated by Pastor Galyon and Associate Pastor Paul Coffey. The total indebtedness at that time was \$41,000. Once again, many gave sacrificially; and in March 1982 (Tess than 30 months later), the final payment on the indebtedness was made, and a mortgage-burning service was set for Homecoming Day, September 5, 1982, with Dr. Virgil Mitchell, General Superintendent, presiding.

The church has recently experienced a period of growth spiritually, numerically, and financially. The present church membership is 59, with an average Sunday school attendance for 1981-82 of 61. It is estimated that the present value of the church property is approximately \$400,000.

We praise the Lord for enabling our church to secure a beautiful place to worship Him, but most of all for His presence in our services.

It is impossible to list the many sacrificial contributions which have been made toward the progress of the Atlanta First Wesleyan Church, however, for every physical, financial, and spiritual contribution made by each pastor, member, and friend, we say a big thank you, and we know the Lord will bless you accordingly.




