or Big Miller Grove Missionary Baptist Church, the road to their long-anticipated worship center was a long one.

But on Feb. 2, Bishop Miles Fowler and his congregation will celebrate the completion of the new \$10 million facility with a ribbon cutting ceremony and a dedication service.

"Our members worked very hard to make this vision come true," said Fowler, who has been pastor of the church since 1977.

The 47,000-square-foot facility that members, friends and wellwishers will give thanks for at the dedication service was on the drawing board for seven years before ground was broken in 1999.

It was completed in December and on Dec. 8, church members marched in a procession from their old sanctuary next door to their new home, which seats 1,500. Fowler said that seeing the completion of the building was "a feeling that was hard to describe.'

"I was happy, ecstatic, grateful, thankful and humble," he said. "We are really blessed by the Lord who brought us to this point."

In addition to a modern sanctuary with state-of-the-art video screens,

audio and closed circuit television, the building has offices, classrooms, nursery and a 100-seat children's church.

Fowler said they plan an administrative and education wing within the next five years, and an assisted living facility sometime later.

"We are building a City of Refuge," he said. "That is what this church is about. That is what God wants us to do."

Fowler said God gave him the vision in 1991 to minister to the

To realize that mission, Big Miller Grove operates 15 ministries with outreaches in nursing homes, prisons and hospitals. It also operates two investment clubs that teach

financial freedom.

Big Miller Grove, which started in 1909 in a founding member's home, was housed in six locations in Lithonia before it bought the 30-acre property on Salem Road. When Fowler arrived 26 years ago, the church had 250 members. Today it has more than 1,500.

In 1994, the church built a Family Life Center that the congregation worshipped in until last December.

With the completion of the new sanctuary, the Family Life Center has become a full-time recreational facility with after-school, seniors' and sports activities that include basketball, aerobics and softball.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony takes place at 2:45 p.m. Fowler will speak at the dedication service at 3 p.m. Tours of the facility will be offered at the end of the service.



Big Miller Grove Church Breaking Ground Sunday

Members of the Big Miller Grove Missionary Baptist Church in Lithonia will be worshipping in a new sanctuary within the next year if plans go as scheduled.

The church recently purchased 28 acres of land at the corner of Salem Road and Old Panola Road. During the first phase of construction, A Big Miller Grove Life Center will be built to serve as place of worship until the main edifice is completed.

"Construction for the Life Center will begin in December and should be completed within six to nine months pending the weather," said John Gordon, chairman of the Church Building Committee. "Phase Two will be the construction of the permanent sanctuary and will begin in two years."


After completion of the sanctuary, the Life Center will become a multipurpose building and will include a college and professional size gymnasium for basketball, volleyball and other recreational activities. It will also include weight rooms, his and her spas and aerobic facilities. A range of special interest courses will be offered on an ongoing basis. In addition, community and professional organizations will be encouraged to utilize the Life Center's meeting spaces.

"It is our desire to build a city of refuge that will not only meet the needs of our congregation but hose in the community as well," according to Minister Miles E. Fowler, pastor of Big Miller Grove since 1977.

BIG MILLER GROVE has been in its present location on Panola Road since moving from a house across the street where it was founded in 1909. The church currently has two services on Sundays in the present sanctuary built 16 years ago to accommodate their congregation of 1500. "We began having an early morning worship service three years ago in order to eliminate the overcrowding conditions," says Pastor Fowler. "We are now at full capacity in both services and have no room to expand in our present location."

The community is invited to share in the ground-breaking ceremony for the Life Center on Sunday, Sept. 27. A motorcade processional will depart Big Miller Grove (2418 Panola Road) at 2 p.m. and travel to the parking lot of Salem Presbyterian Church (5197 Salem Road). Additional parking will also

be available at the Salem CrossingsShopping Center. After parking, participants will take part in an organized walk to the ground-breaking ceremony site.
