### HISTORY OF PROSPECT METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH SOUTH, SITUATED AT CHAMBLEE, DEKALB COUNTY GEORGIA.

The first building was a split log house, as most all churches, schoolhouses and dwellings were at that period, with a few small windows cut through the logs. It stood about 100 ft. in the rear of the present building. The next building was erected in 1847, and was just in the rear of the present one. It was a frame house weather-boarded with rough boards, windows without sash, no ceiling inside, floor laid with undressed boards which left large cracks, no stove or heating device. It was very comfortable in warm or pleasant weather, but colder in Winter than being out in the sunshine. Yet the saints praised God in singing the old church hymns, and in prayer and exhortations to the uplifting of their spiritual fervor, often to such a degree as to make December as pleasant as May. The present nice comfortable building was erected in 1885 just in front of the former one, and dedicated by Bro, Bigham, the first Sunday in July of that year.

I have been unable to find any records whatever of the first twelve or fifteen years of this church. So can't give names in full of charter members, but will give as far as my information goes.

Stephen Tilly and family, consisting of three sons and four daughters, all were devout members. The sons were Ebenezar, Robert, and Fletcher. The former and latter spending all their lives in this section were men of marked piety. Robert went to Floyd County, Georgia, when a young man, and was an honor to the church and community where he lived. The daughters, Margaret, Adeline, Caroline and Jane were all women of the highest Christian type, their children rise up and call them blessed.

David Ballenger and family were members. He and his son William were local preachers; he also had two or three daughters. This family was a part of the salt of the earth.

Dr. John Ballenger and family, of whom I know but little, were all Methodists. They moved to Cobb County early in the history of this church.

Other members were John M. Ridling and family, Thomas Akin and family. There were still a few others who helped to plant this vine, but I am unable to name them. This little band, while few in number, were inspired to make all the sacrifices necessary that our beloved Methodism might be instrumental in salvation of souls, and glory for the great Head of the church. Others come into the church from time to time. They were also men of God, and so recognized by all who came in contact with them. Their names also deserve to remembered and perpetuated for their good influence and works for the church. Some of these are as follows: Samuel House, class leader, who was full of zeal and ferver, and often so filled with the Holy Ghost that his cup would run over. Jake Loyd, also a class leader and a good man; devoted to duty whatever it might be. Joseph Elliott one of the best and finest men that I ever know and exerted a great influence over all that he came in contact with. Asa Braswell, George Gaddy, Affred Peel and Frances Metcalf were all true to the church and no evil reports were ever made against them. Later came George Braswell, he was one of the best young men of the country, was licenced to preach and was very gifted, but was called in defence of our South Land and in that service passed to his home in Glory. His brother, our beloved S. H. Braswell, a preacher of fine ability and very efficient did much for the church at large, filling many charges as a supply and was especially very helpful to Prospect. John T. McElroy came to us from the Presbyterian church and was licensed to preach. He had a very bright mind and a live christian experience. He

... Q. BC & BOI DECATUR, GA. 30030 was a rather frail man and the good Lord took him. Then there was Philip, Jake, George, John, Jeff and Crocket House all good men. Nowt Miller was a man of prayer, loved the church and all good people. Dr. George N. Flowers, one among the last to cross over, of the old band, was a staunch friend to the church and beloved by all who knew him.

All these from charter members down to the last one named, besides many others including good women, have crossed over and are resting under the shade of the trees in the New Jerusalem.

Oh! What a multitude of our loved ones and friends are up yonder waiting and watching for us. God help us to be faithful so that some sweet day we will meet them again.

Prospect was in the Decatur Circuit until some years ago, when it was made Norcross and Prospect Charge. In the early history of Decatur Circuit, as well as all other circuits at that time, each Charge had quite a number of churches. This caused the pastor, who was then called the circuit rider, to preach from four to six days in the week in order to get around once a month. Therefore, Prospect had week-day preaching once a month by the paster, Wednesday, I think, being the day. This lasted until about 1885 to 1860. Nevertheless, we had services three Sundays in the month, preaching one Sunday by a local preacher, prayer meeting one Sunday. and class meeting one Sunday. The remaining Sunday we went where we chose, genorally to Nancy's Creek. Our prayer and class meeting days were good and often the Holy Spirit was very manifest. In those days we had a goodly number of local preachers in the Decatur Circuit, which was a great blessing to the church and to the people. They were men of very marked piety, and their preaching was often accompanied by the presence of the Holy Spirit. These devout men would ride from ton to twenty miles to an appointment: I now call the names of all that come to my mind: Noah Smith, David Ballenger, Henry Clark, Jimmie Williams, Elijah Byrd, Dr. Fowler, Joe Huie, William Holbrook, S. H. Braswoll, Mr. Chandler. I may have omitted some. These also have passed away and rest from their labors, and their works do follow them.

There has been a Sunday School at Prospect for more than seventy-five years.

I had hoped that I would be able to give the name and statistical report of all the pastors that served this church at least until 1870. Since that time we have perfect records. I failed to find any records, even annual conference minutes prior to the Civil War except for a few years which I found through the courtesy of Prof. Stone at Oxford Collego. We found a few old copies of the Georgia Conferance which were very meager in the statistical reports. I give them as follows: 1838 Docatur Circuit, Chorokoo District, A. Pennington pastor, J. H. MoArver junior preacher. White members 566, colored members 74. Eight local preachers. 1846, J. B. Jackson, Pastor, 1847, A. Ray pastor, E. Spoer, Junior preacher. 1848 and 49, J. W. Yarborough pastor, Winn Junior preacher, 1850, Noah Smith pastor, Neese junior preacher, 1351 J. L. Smith pastor, J. E. Sentell Junior Preacher, 1852, R. Lane Pastor, J. R. Owens junior preacher, 1853, J. L. Davies pastor, W. M. Watts junior preacher, 1854 J. H. Ewing pastor, 1955, Dahlonoga District, Albert Gray Pastor. White members 1150, colored 329. Paid Missions \$55.00. Conference Collections \$18.00. 1886, Alford Dorman pastor; H. H. Parks presiding elder. 1857, J. M. Armstrong pastor, white members 457, colored members 152. Paid Mission \$91.00, conference collection \$16.00. Sunday School \$4.00. 1858, Atlanta District A. Maulsby pastor: White members 417, colored members 176. Paid Missions \$87.00, Conference \$21.00. 1855, N. E. Ousley Pastor, White members 393, colored members 175. Conference Collections \$14.75. Ousley-Chappell in Dekalb County was organized by this preacher and named for him. 1860, T. T. Arnold pastor, J. W. Yar-boraugh presiding Elder. White members 534, colored members 200. Conference Collections \$15.05. 1801, J.-H: Mashburn paston. J. W. Yarborough presiding elder.

1862, J. M. Lowry pastor, 1863 -- Williams, pastor, 1864, H. Crawford pastor, Walter Branham, presiding elder. 1865-66, J. J. Morgan pastor. 1867, W. A. Dodge pastor, Habersham Adams, Presiding Elder. White members 563. Paid pastor \$198. Paid Presiding Elder \$12.00. Conference collection \$10,00, missions \$130.00. 1868, W. A. Dodge pastor. This is the first record I have found where the amount paid the preacher was stated; how our preachers lived in those days on the little pittance paid them is something for us to think about. There was no work too poor or too hard for these consecrated men to serve. You observe in these ante-bollum days the Negroes were members of our churches. They had no organization of their own until they were freed. A few seats in the rear of the church was reserved for them. Some of them were very zealous and loved the church, and were religious in their homes. They also had among them preachers full of the Höly Ghost.

I would not forget to speak of the Exhorter we had in those days. They were a class of mon who did a lot of good, and were often used by the preacher in closing the services by exhortation, song, and prayer. I mention one that in the long ago belonged to this church, Elijah Boggs. He was unlearned, not knowing a letter in the book, but know many hymns and much scripture by memory. His exhortation and prayers were full of the Holy Ghost and Power and would reach the hearts of the people.

In the last fifty years we have had quite a number of preachers whose talents, lives, and all that they had were consecrated to the church and Kingdom of our Heavenly Father; endeavering to help the Christian to a better life and the sinners to repent and be saved. Such men are worthy of our appreciation and gratitude. They are Rev's. Jesse Boring, James Ivans, F. B. Davies, G. E. Gardner, C. C. Casey, W. T. Lane, W. A. Farris, W. W. Lampkin, Walter Yarborough, W. M. D. Bend, W. A. Simmons, W. P. Smith, J. R. Mason, J. T. Christian, H. M. Newton, W. M. Winn, M. W. Arneld, W. F. Rebinson, J. W. Quillan, W. B. Dillard, C. V. Weathers, J. S. Sappington, A. D. Echels, R. M. Dixon, A. C. Cantrell, V. E. Landford, and C. P. Garey, our present beloved paster. Most of these have gone to their Mansion above.

When we look up to Heaven with an eye of faith and behold the large velume of prayers uttered by these Saints, from the beginning down to this good day, for us and our beloved church, we ought to take fresh courage and strive to be better men and women than ever before. We should appreciate more and more what our ancestors have done for us, and thank God most sincerely for the church and all these good men and women, and especially for His Son our Savier who gave himself for us that we might have everlasting life.

May Heavens richest blessing be with you and the future members of Prospect. And some sweet day may we form an unbroken church in the paradise of our Father.

This history is dodicated to the memory of my precious mother, who was a charter member and the last surviving one, she passed over in her one-hundred and second year.

The Mother of the writer, S. T. McElroy was formerly Margaret Tilly, wife of William McElroy. She is still remembered by many of the older members of Prospect. She was familiarly known as Aunt Margaret but more affectionately known as "Grannie McElroy".

In 1920, and for the next three years, Uncle Nath Thompson preached and worked and saw six class rooms added, by taking from the auditorium to make four and adding two with entrance on front.

In 1926, under the leadership of J. W. O. McKibbon, Pastor, the 100th Anniversary of the Church was planned. October 31, 1926 was a great day, one ever to be remembered by those present.

Sunday School at 10:00 o'cles't. Preaching by A. Candler. Text - John 21:3 - "I Go A-Fishing", an able sermon. At moon dinner for all in the grove. In the afternoon an Anniversary Program. As complete a history of the church as could possibly be made, after weeks of study by S. T. McElrey, was road by him and if it is available, will be placed in safe-keeping for the church in later years. At the close of the program a big Birthday Cake with 100 candles was sliced and divided among the older members and visitors.

Also, during the pastorate of Rev. McKibben, the property lines were established and marked. The old silver communion service, consisting of two goblets, pitcher and two plates were replaced with a new individual service costing \$65.00.

Following the pastorate of Raw, McKibbon, Rev, A, J, Scars served faithfully for one year. Beginning in 1927, three years of faithful service were given by Dr. T, M. Elliott, S. P. Wiggins, Bresiding Elder.

Then came a change from North Atlanta District into Decatur-Oxford District, R. Z. Tyler, Presiding Elder and J. J. Copeland paster for two years. Rev. E. P. Eubanks served well for the next three years followed by Rev. H. C. Stratton - Dr. Wallace Rogers, Presiding Elder.

For five years Rev. Stratton labored with love and helped push forward the building of the West wing of the church for classrooms and also rest rooms, Mrs. Stratton guided the organization of the Young Women's Service Guild. The Guild is now growing and active and a great blessing to the cause of the church at present.

1940 - Dr. E. G. Mackay District Supt. - Rev. E. P. Etheridge Pastor - Change into East Atlanta District. By the untiring help of the pastor, the church was brought up into a place of station having for years been a one-half station with Norcross.

B. L. Barton was the first pastor for full time. During his pastorate a nice brick parsonage was built and furnished. He served two years and was followed by C. E. Brantloy. During Rev. Brantley's two years the church auditorium was reworked throughout - new overhead, new floors, new windows and new furnishings. A Pulpit Bible was given by Mrs. A. J. Sears and Misses Dorothy and Mary (Now Mrs. H. H. Allen) Walker in memory of Rev. A. J. Sears. The Hymnals were given in memory of Mrs. Green, sister of Mrs. Minors. The cross for the communion table given by Mr. and Mrs. S. D. Johnson, Sr. in memory of their parents. Mr. J. W. Purcell donated the Baptismal Pedestal. Each were dedicated at different times, as given, by the pastor.

Rev. J. C. Moore served the next three years and shared in the plans for building the East wing and basement with kitchen, also furnishing most of the class rooms.

Rev. J. Howell Hearn, now closing his second year as pastor, has shared in the work of furnishing the kitchen and had the pleasure of dedicating a new electric organ.

These are a few outstanding developments up to the present. But most important of all regular worship services have been held. It has in the years past and continues to be a place for spiritual uplift and fellowship and a blessing for all who attend.

### PROSPECT METHODIST OHUROH

Among the oldest Methodist Churches in Dekalb County is Prospect near Chambles, organized in 1826.

Formerly the Presbyterians and Methodists worshipped together where the Presbyterian cemetery is today, in a little log building, having the service of a prescher when either Presbyterian or Methodist was available.

Bible classes were held in the different homes on Sabbath afternoons.

When they became strong enough, and could have more regular preaching services they divided, the Presbyterians building a Church in Doraville on the present church site, and the Methodist moving down the road a little distance, toward what is now Chamblee but no town was there at that time.

The present building is the third one and mearer the Feachtree road.

The first one back some distance, a log building built in 1826.

Among the charter members of Prospect church were the Stephen Tilly family, Riddling family, Ballenger family and William MeElroy family.

Aunt Margaret McElroy lived into this present generation. Many still remember her. She was the wife of William McElroy. She continued her membership at Prospect Church and died at the age of 1012 years. She was beloved by all who know her.

Her son, S. T. McElroy, wrote a history of the church.

After a few years a larger log church was built a little nearer the road.

As the community grew in population, so the church grew, and again they planned to build.

In the late 1870's the present building, except the class rooms, was built, being the third since they began in 1826.

In 1905-1910, several of the leading families, including the Metcalfs, Tillys, Edisons, Christians, and others, sold out their farms and moved to Turner County in South Georgia.

They organized a church and named it "Frospect".

It was such a blow to the church that despondency and failure seemed to gain right of way.

But for the encouragement, and scriptural challenge given from the pulpit by the Pastor, Rev. J. S. T. Sappington, it might have been harder.

In 1919 Rev. Nath Thompson served and six classrooms were added to the auditorium.

In 1926 under the leadership of Fastor J. W. O. McKibben, the 100th Anniversary was carefully planned. It was on Oct. 31, a great day, one ever to be remembered by those present.

A sermon was preached in the morning by A. Candler, text, "I go a fishing". John 21:3. An able sermon.

Dinner was served in the grove for all.

In the afternoon there was an anniversary program.

A history of the church, as complete as could possibly be found, was read by S. T. McElroy. He had spent weeks in the preperation of it.

No one knows where it is at present, but he hopes to find it and place it in safe keeping for the church in later years.

Following the reading of the history, a large beautiful bitthday cake was out and passed to the older members and visitors.

During the 4 years pastorate of Rev. McKibben the lines of church property were established and marked; the old silver communion service consisting of 2 geblets, pictures and plates were replaced with a new individual service costing (65.00.

The next pastor, Ray. T. M. Elliott served 3 years. S. P. Viggins was the Presiding Elder.

- J. J. Copland was pastor for the next two years, with a change into the Decatur-Oxford District. R. Z. Tyler was the Fresiding Elder.
- E. P. Eubanks was pastor for the next 5 years. He was followed by Rev. H. C. Stratton for five years. Dr. Wallace Rogers was Fresiding Elder.

Mrs. Stratton guided the organization of young women's Service Guild which is today growing and active and a great blessing to the Church.

In 1940 the West wing was added to give more space for classes. Dr. E. C. Mackay was District Superintendent and Rev. E. P. Ethridge, paster. Their untiring efforts brought the church into the place of a station.

9. L. Barton was the first full time pastor. He served 2 years.

A parsonage was built alongside the church yard.

Rev. C. E. Brantley served for the next 2 years, and during this time the church auditorium was reworked throughout. New overhead, new floors, new windows.

A pulpit Bible was given by Mrs. Sears, Miss Dorothy Walker and Mrs. H. H. Allen in memory of Rev. A. J. Sears.

The hymnals were given in memory of Mrs. Green, sister of Mrs. Minors.

Mr. & Mrs. S. D. Johnson, Sr., gave the cross for the communion table in memory of their parents.

Mr. Furcell donated the Baptismal pedestal. Mach of these were dedicated at the time they were given.

Rev. J. O. Moore served for 3 years, and the East Wing of the church and basement with kitchen were added.

Rev. J. Howell Hearn, present pastor is finishing his second year as pastor. A new electric organ was bought and dedicated by him.

These are a few outstanding developments up to date. But most important of all, regular worship services have been held. It has, and continues to be a place for spiritual uplift and fellowship and blessings for all who attend.

### OUR CHURCH


First Methodist was organized in 1826. It was then named Prospect. Two and one-half acres of land were acquired. Records of the transaction were lost in the 1844 Courthouse fire. Executors of the estate of J. W. Reeves issued a warranty deed in 1855. Six acres were purchased in 1895, and three more in 1901.

The first Church was an unheated log structure. In 1847 a rough board building replaced it. The third Church was built in 1885. Church School rooms were added in 1937 and in 1947. A three story Education Building was completed in 1955. These were located at 5588 Peachtree Road.

By a vote of the Congregation the name was changed from Prospect to First Methodist in 1961.

In 1963 the Congregation voted to relocate. Old Chamblee was giving way to Industrial Development. Thirty-eight and onetenth acres were purchased at 4147 Chamblee-Dunwoody Road.

The present Georgian Structure was begun in 1965.



Georgia legislature formed DeKalb County

### 1826

Prospect Methodist Church was founded. Since the Methodists had no building, they worshiped for a time with the Presbyterians. There was preaching when a preacher of either denomination was available.

### 1844

First reference to Sunday School at the Prospect Church.

### 1846

First conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

### 1847

We do not have a date for the first building, but the second church building on the Peachtree Road site was erected at this time. It was a frame structure with no ceiling, undressed floor boards and no heat.

### 1851

Prospect Church was 25 years old. A deed for the first 2.5 acres was executed to the trustees.

### 1867

Prospect Methodist had 563 members.

### 1873

A railroad was completed through the area, then known as Roswell Junction.

### 1885

Roswell Junction became Chamblee.

The third church building was erected di

The third church building was erected directly in front of the 1847 structure.

### 1895

Six additional acres of land purchased for \$245.

### 1897

Chamblee & Norcross churches became a Station with the pastor residing in the Norcrossparsonage

### 1901

75th Anniversary. Three additional acres were purchased.

### 1905

Women's Missionary Society was organized.

### 1918

Men's Bible Class and Ladies' Bible Class formed.

### 1926

100th anniversary of Prospect Methodist Church.

### 1933

Women's Missionary Society became Women's Society of Christian Service and Young Women's Service Guild was formed.

### 1938

Forum Class was formed for young couples and Pilot Class was formed for young men.

### 1940

Prospect became a full station; Rev. B.L. Barton was the first full time pastor.

### 1942

Brick parsonage on Peachtree Road was built.

### 1946

Fidelis Class was formed for young matrons.

### 1948

A Scouting program was started.

### 1951

125th anniversary of Prospect Methodist Church celebrated on November 29th.

### 1953

A second co-ed class was formed-The Glow Class

### 1956

The Wesley Class (a third co-ed class) was formed

### 1957

The Kindergarten program was started.

### 1959

Faith Class, a new class for young couples began. The first sound system was installed.

### 1961

Name changed from Prospect Methodist to First Methodist Church, Chamblee. Membership was 972.

### 1963

The congregation voted to relocate to the present site on Chamblee Dunwoody Road.

### 1965

The first library was established, and revived again after a few years at our present site.

### 1966

Church membership is now 1243, with a Sunday School membership of 880.

### 1967

January 1, the first service was held at the new site on Chamblee Dunwoody Road in what is now the Fellowship Hall. Approximately 1000 attended.

December 3, a consecration service was held for the new parsonage on Wyndale Court.

### 1968

In April the General Conference of the Methodist Church & the Evangelical United Brethren consummated a union and our name was changed to First United Methodist Church, Chamblee.

That summer the Official Bd. became the Administrative Board and the Policy Committee became the Council on Ministries.


