CHURCH HISTORY - EMMANUEL AME ZION CHURCH

On August 11, 1991 in the home of Rev. & Mrs. Frederick A. Williamson a meeting was called with the intent of starting a new society within the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church. Presiding Officer: Rev. Frederick A. Williamson

All of the above persons with the exception of Ms. Olivia Mitchell were received by Rev. Williamson and became the founding members of this society.

Under the leadership of The Right Reverend Bishop Cecil Bishop, the borders of the AME Zion Church were expanded because on September 8, 1991 at the Georgia-South Georgia Annual Conference Emmanuel AME Zion was admitted into the connection as a mission church.

Our first worship service was held at the Holiday Inn Conference Center in downtown Decatur, Georgia from there we moved to Fountain Memorial AME Church, Clarkston, Georgia. Here we held our services from 1:30 p.m. until 3:00 p.m.

Of course we were anxious to find a permanent home and start worshiping at the 11:00 a.m. hour, but for nine months we rented and worshiped out of a day care center after our lease was not renewed we found ourselves worshiping in the homes of the pastor and Mr. & Mrs. Joseph Strother.

The small band of members soon became known as the nomadic church. For 3 ½ years we wondered until in 1994 the Stone Mountain Advent Christian Church agreed to let us lease with option to buy. For a year we held our services at 12:30 while we sought financing from the our connectional church as well as local banks.

On August 20, 1995 after receiving a loan from First Union and other funds from the AME Zion Church we dedicated our new church home located at the above address (consisting of a Family Life Center/gymnasium, and 3 bedroom parsonage as well as 4 classrooms in the lower level of the church). Growth began to develop as soon as we got some permanency from 12 members in 1995 to 140 members in 1997

The 7500 square foot gymnasium as been renamed The George E. Battle, Jr. Family Life Center to honor Bishop Battle for his untiring efforts to secure us a loan.

We are now in the process of seeking funds to begin a daycare and after school program.
