There was a great need of a Baptist Church in Doraville. After many months of investigating and oraying by Dr. A. Scott Patterson, Missionary Emeritus, Foreign Mission Board, and Rev. H. F. Faires, Field Worker in the Lawrenceville Association, it was decided that a Missionary Baptist Church would be organized in Doraville by faith in God and cooperation of the people.

The first meeting was a grayer meeting held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Humphrey on Feachtree Road in boraville. The prayer service was led by Dr. Scott Patterson and Rev. R. F. Faires with 24 people attending. Beginning October 16, 1949, regular Sunday School and Church services were held by this group in the Doraville School Building. At 2:30 F.M., November 27, 1949, in the Doraville School Building, a meeting was held for the purpose of constituting a Baptist Church in Doraville composed of the group of people who had been meeting in the school building.

Dr. Patterson, acting as moderator, explained the purpose of the meeting and an invitation was given to those desiring to become members to come forward at that time. Those presenting themselves for church membership that day were:

The First Eaptist Church of Doraville presented itself for membership in the Lawrenceville Association at the annual meeting held August 30-31, 1950 and was accepted.

In December 1949, application was made by the Church to the Executive Committee of the Georgia Baptist Convention for aid in building. The Executive Committee granted the Church \$2,000.00 which was used by the Church to apply to the cost of the lot for the original church building. On January 11, 1950, Dr. Patterson informed the Church that he had assumed all responsibility for along the contract for the lot and that he felt absolutely sure that God wanted this property for this church.

During the first year, the Woman's Eissionary Society with its auxiliaries was organized as well as a graded Training Union. The organization of a Protherhood in June of 1952 have the Church a complete program enlisting all age groups, made and female, in missionary work.

The original church building was erected by members of same at a cost of approximately \$5,000.00. The Board of Trustees consisting of Mr. C. F. kellam, Er. R. C. Barrett, Mr. H. A. Holbrook, Er. Roy Holbrook and Mr. R. W. Vanzant, served as the Building and Planning Committee and were responsible for the building of the Planning Committee and were responsible for the building on May church. The first services were held in the new building on May church. The Church then had a membership of 113 and Sunday School enrolment of 216. Dr. Scott exterson served as Supply Pauter until the Church was in a position to call its first pastor. The first pastor was dev. C. S. Sneed who was colled by the church on June 20, 1951. Rev. Sneed served in this capacity until December 14, 1952, resigning to enter the service of the United States implies Chaptain. Our present pastor, Rev. J. M. Mooten, was called by the Church on February 11, 1953.

During the same year, the church became free of its indebtedness for the original building and lot. The building was dedicated on November 29, 1953 with Lr. Scott Patterson preaching the dedicatory sermon and Rev. R. F. Faires offering the dedicatory prayer.

By the fell of 1953, the Church had grown in membership and in Bunday School attendance to such an extent that it was decided to ead to the church building. Six additional class rooms and a baptistry were added at a cost of \$10,000.00 in the early part of 1954. The current continued to grow and at a called meeting of the Church on bestember 25, 1954 it was voted to buy, install and equity a room barrocks building from the lawson General Hospital for use as Sun-dalked day School rooms. In. J. C. Preser was responsible for carrying out the wishes of the Church as to the barracks building.

In June of 1954 the Church agreed to purchase an additional lot adjacent to its property to be used for future expansion. The lot was purchased from Dr. J. W. Wers, as were the atters.




