BRIEF HISTORY OF LAWRENCEVILLE ROAD UNITED METHODIST CHURCH

Dr. Delma Hagood, District Superintendent of the Decatur-Oxford District in 1961, worked with the Executive Committee of the District Board of Missions and Church Extension to find a suitable location for a new Methodist Church in the Rehoboth Community. On December 28, 1961, through the \$10 Club," \$18,000.00 was made available on the purchase of the present site at a total cost of \$33,750.00. The local congregation paid \$6,000 and the Board of Missions paid \$9,000. The property consisted of 6.7 acres, a ranch type dwelling and an unfinished adjacent building. Partitions were removed from one section of the house to form a chapel and the remaining five rooms served as a parsonage.

On January 18, 1962, the Reverend Leland Bagwell was appointed as Pastor, and came only on weekends, until his graduation from West Georgia in June. On January 28, 1962, members of the Tucker, Briarcliff and Clarkston Methodist Churches joined Rev. Bagwell and his family in a survey of the area. On February 4, 1962, the first worship service was held with fifteen people attending.

On March 18, 1962, Dr. Hagood presided over the Constituting Conference and the Church was officially chartered with twenty-five members. The Church was named Lawrenceville Road at the first Quarterly Conference on April 29, 1962, and a budget of \$2,400 was accepted.

In June the Pastor moved, with his wife Alice and children David, Don and Julia, into the parsonage. In September 1962, Rev. Bagwell entered Candler School of Theology.

By the fall of 1962 the membership had grown to 41. Sunday School classes were organized for all ages and the church boasted of two choirs -- one for adults and one for children. In the Spring of 1963 more rooms were needed by the growing Sunday School. The little chicken house on the property was converted for use at a cost of \$1,100, plus a great deal of labor from the congregation.

In April 1964, the North Georgia Conference Board of Missions, with Dr. Claud Haynes serving as Executive Secretary, retired the remaining indebtedness of \$8,491 on the property.

On March 16, 1965, a Building Committee was elected by the fourth Quarterly Conference. The committee was to make plans for a permanent building.

Cunningham and Forehand were selected as architects and on March 3, 1966, they presented final drawings to the congregation of the proposed overall plan of buildings.

A loan from Tucker Federal Savings & Loan in the amount of \$45,000 was approved and an additional gift from the Conference Board of Missions of \$11,000 was placed in the bank to be used for construction costs. Ground breaking services were held on May 29, 1966, with Dr. Frank Moorhead, Atlanta-Emory District Superintendent, presiding. Construction began in August 1966. The opening services in the new building were held on February 26, 1967.

In 1968, a parsonage was purchased on Hebron Hills Drive for \$30,000, and the parsonage family moved in during June 1968.

In the Spring of 1968, construction began on the educational building. The building was completed and consecrated services were held on February 23, 1969. The cost was \$89,000.

A Brief History of Lawrenceville Road United Methodist Church

Lawrenceville Road United Methodist Church was chartered on March 18, 1962 with twenty-one members. The property at that time included 6.7 acres, a rearch style bungalow and an unfinished adjacent "chicken house". Reverend Leland Bagwell was appointed as pastor and came only on weekends until his graduation from West Georgia in June. During the early days the house was used as a Sanctuary, Sunday School, and a parsonage. In the Spring of 1963 the chicken house was converted to a Sunday School Building. On March 16, 1965, pland began on the Fellowship Hall and ground braking services were held on March 1966. The opening services were held on February 26, 1967. In 1968, a parsonage was purchased on Hebron Hills Drive. In the Spring of 1968, construction began on the Educational Building. Consecration Services were held on February 23, 1969. In 1980, planning began for the new Sanctuary. Ground breaking services were held on November 14, 1982. Consecration services were held on September 18, 1983.
