

The Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Messiah began when seventeen individuals met in the Sunday School rooms of the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer on Sunday, January 17, 1932, and decided to establish a second Lutheran church in Atlanta. The following Sunday the congregation was formally organized at the home of Mrs. Laura Cook with 19 charter members.

The first place of worship was St. Timothy's Episcopal Chapel on Boulevard Drive, N.E., in the Kirkwood section of Atlanta. Mr. Charles H. Stieglitz, a layman with great faith, guided the mission through the organizational phase. Through his leadership the Church of the Messiah was incorporated under the laws of Georgia on May 13, 1932. In 1933, Messiah was admitted to the Georgia-Alabama Synod in March and on May 28th the congregation purchased a house at 1969 Boulevard Drive for \$1800 with \$200 down and \$20 per month. This was later sold for \$2500 in January 1934.

On May 21, 1933, the Rev. James A. Rikard became the first regular pastor, supply pastors having served the congregation until then. Worship was still being held in St. Timothy's Episcopal Chapel when the Rev. George F. Hart was installed as the second pastor September 1, 1935. On November 10th of that year two lots with a two-story house on one of them were purchased for \$4400. Services were held in the rooms on the first floor of the house until July 1st when the small colonial chapel built on the vacant lot was dedicated. The purchase and the building were financed by a loan of \$3500 from the Board of American Missions and a loan from Mrs. Bookhoop of Savannah.

The Rev. J. Milton Frick served from January 15, 1940 as the third pastor of Messiah. Under his leadership a parsonage was purchased for \$7000 at 541 Whitefoord Avenue. Though convinced that the Howard Street location was disadvantageous, Pastor Frick was unable to persuade the congregation to move.

His successor the Rev. Dermon A. Sox who was installed August 1, 1944 had greater success. On August 20, 1946 the mortgage on the Howard Street property was burned. That very month the congregation voted to move to Decatur with the prospect of greater service to its people and because of the feeling of a need of greater opportunity to serve the unchurched.

The greater portion of the present property on Clairmont Avenue was purchased for \$25,000 which was financed by \$23,750 borrowed from the Board of American Missions. The Howard Street property was sold for \$15,000 in December and the first service in Decatur was

held in the Clairmont School on Erie Avenue. The facilities were rented for fifteen dollars a month and included the services of the colored janitor, who with his wife, attended the Lutheran services.

From February 4, 1946 through July 16, 1949 the petition of the congregation to have the property rezoned for church purposes was continually opposed on the grounds, or rather the fears, of nearby residents that the small size of the congregation coupled with the legal fact that the only zoning change under the law at that time would have been for business. There was no zoning for church purposes only. Hence it was possible that the corner might be leased as the site of a gasoline station. Lack of understanding of the financial backing given Lutheran missions by the national board was undoubtedly the cause of much hostility. By court order the petition was granted in 1949.

Meanwhile the parsonage on Whitefoord Avenue was sold for \$9750 at the pastor's suggestion, and he and his family moved to the second floor of the large house then on the property.

August 15, 1949 when ground was broken for the present chapel was a great day for the congregation. On February 19, 1950 the structure faced with Stone Mountain granite was dedicated. Three years later a parsongage at 2939 North Decatur Road was bought for \$14,500 again through aid from the Board of Missions. The Rev. Cecil W. Carpenter was installed on January 1, 1954 as fourth pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Messiah. Under his leadership the congregation in the summer of 1955 embarked on a successful campaign to raise funds to eliminate the building fund debt and to erect a parish and education building. The mortgage on the church building was burned September 6, 1957 and the longed for parish education building became possible. Work on it was begun following the ground breaking November 9, 1958 and the completed building dedicated December 13, 1959.

The church continued to grow both in numbers and physically. In July, 1966 a new organ was dedicated and the next year Parcel#1 of the Slack property was purchased for use as a parking lot. In was during the negotiations for this lot that the Congregation entered into an agreement to purchase the adjoining Slack property in three parcels. That labeled Parcel 2 has been purchased and is the area behind the Slack residence. As long as Mrs. Slack lives Parcel 3 of the property remains hers and the Congregation has an option to buy it at her death.

Under Pastor Carpenter's leadership the Messiah served as instructional ground for Seminarians first of Gettysburg and then of

Southern between their junior and senior year. Ten Seminarians served their internship at the Messiah 1965-71 and 1974-78. All are now ordained Lutheran ministers: William Diamond, Fred Krautwurst, Donald Main, Donald Lindman, John Grill, Kenneth Schott, Sam Moore, Richard Fritz, Gary Schimmer and Friedrich Hahler who was from Germany.


In August, 1960, the present parsonage at 2430 Tanglewood Road was purchased for \$28,500 with the aid of the Mission Board. Following Pastor Carpenter's resignation in April the Rev. George W. Fisher became the fifth pastor of Messiah on September 10, 1978. Meanwhile the Congregation voted to build the Office Building Addition connecting the two existing buildings. On June 17, 1979 this was dedicated, having been built with a \$90,000 loan from Aid Association for Lutherans.

Pastor Fisher resigned the charge and preached for the last time on September 7, 1980. After several months the Rev. Dr. Robert E. Lee, Pastor Emeritus of the Lutheran Church of the Redeemer, became the Interim Pastor of the Congregation an office which he has filled with love and devotion. Because of his guidance and persistence, the Congregation now awaits the coming of a full-time pastor.

No more fitting conclusion to this brief history can be written than a paraphrase of that which was used at the Silver Anniversary, of Messiah. As the first fifty years have brought realities far beyond the dreams of those 17 dedicated Lutherans who met on January 17, 1932 so may our dreams for the second half of a century in the work of the Lutheran Church of the Messiah be realized and exceeded through a faith and through prayers equal to those of the charter members.

Minister Sees Red

"I have a certain amount of compassion," says the Rev. Haco W. Vonhacke, pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Messiah on Clairemont Avenue in Decatur, "but I began to see red!"

He was referring to the visit early this week of Carol Walston, a self-described homeless woman who makes a habit of borrowing money from local churches. She persuaded the Rev. Vonhacke to pay for a motel room and also asked him for \$75 for a pair of shoes.

"I don't have enough money to buy myself a pair of shoes, much less any that cost \$75," he said. He put the woman up in the Hampton Inn on Buford Highway and the desk clerks there recognized her, he said. He added that another local motel won't allow her to come back.

She drove up to the church on Monday in a taxi and tried to get the church secretary to pay for the taxi fare, a volunteer, working in the church at the time, observed. When the secretary refused, Ms. Walston got very angry. She insisted that the secretary call the minister at home and that he promise to "be good for" the taxi fare. The taxi driver, after waiting for some time, drove off in disgust, the volunteer noted.

places," the Rev. Vonhacke said. The trash can in the church office was full of wrappers from antihistamine medications, he said.

Ms. Walston's parents live in Decatur but she doesn't have anything to do with them, he said. Instead, she considers herself homeless but seeks out a plush motel room rather than one of the homeless shelters, he said.

"She has nowhere to go," he said. She stayed in his church office for about two hours on Mon-

day, he said.

'She doesn't look like a street person," he said. "She's clean, extremely well-spoken. She's not stupid. I would say that she's had some college. But she is antichurch and she believes that instead of buying new red carpet the church should give the money to

"She is down on the system," he said, noting that she did attend 2 services at his church on Sunday, "She knew that she had to get 🔾 back into my good graces," he said, adding that she has come to him for help several times before.

"We have, counting women and children, a congregation of about 250," he said, explaining that thechurch just does not have the resources to handle such people in need. Two other people had also stopped by the church that day seeking handouts, he said.
