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



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

The centennial celebration joins many landmarks in the long history of Midway. The first church was composed of members from churches in Augusta, Decatur and the Indian Creek community. It was a decade before a

pastor's salary was paid. Members were canvassed in order to have a pastor "for divine services twice a month, if not oftener." This notation in the minutes of the session was followed by a notation a year later stating that the salary actually paid was \$25. The monument fund exceeded this figure by 25 cents.

The church has grown substantially since that date, having occupied four buildings and listened to sermons from many different pastors, most of them better paid than that first one.

A listing at the end of the first book of minutes shows that the only alternative to being an active member of Midway was either to have died or gone to the Baptists. Those of the latter category, as well as former former members and guests, are invited to Midway' 100th homecoming.

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84th Anniversary To Be Observed by **Midway Church**

Midway Presbyterian church next Sunday, May 18, will commemorate its 84th year as a Sunday school and its 82nd year as a Presbyterian church. It was first organized on May 17, 1874, as a union Sunday school outpost, according to the pastor, the Rev. Wade H. Bell, Jr.

The Presbytery of Atlanta formally organized the Sunday school into a church on July 29, 1876.

At the anniversary service next Sunday a guest minister, the Rev. Dr. Bonneau H. Dickson, executive secretary of the Committee of Church Extension of Atlanta Presbytery, will preach at the morning services.

Dinner on the grounds will follow, and at 2 p.m. another worship service will be held under the leadership of the Rev. Mr. Bell, who invited members and friends to the church to join in the anniversary services.

The church is located at 4139 Midway road.

The Rev. Woody McKay will be installed as pastor of Midway Presbyterian Church, 3363 Midway Road in Decatur, at 7 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 5.

Dr. Robert Ramey of the Columbia Theological Seminary facultywill bring the message with representatives from other congregations taking various parts in theservice.

The Rev. McKay brings a diverse experience to the Midway Church. He has served pastorates in North Carolina and northwest Florida, and as a campus minister at Florida State University in Tallahassee and, most recently, at

Georgia Tech.

For the past six years, he has done interim pastorates with four Georgia congregations reaching from West Point to Roswell.

Midway Church Lays Plans to Honor Founder

Window to be unveiled September 23, Honoring G. W. Lyon and Wife.

Midway Presbyterian Ohurch, one of the county's older religious institutions, has set aside Sunday, September 23, as "Lyon Day", and at the 11 o'clock service in the morning will unveil a beautiful window, perpetuating the memory of its founder and his wife - Mr. and Mrs. George W. Lyons.

Rev. Eli Thomas, pastor of the church, said this week the window was a gift of two daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Lyons, Mrs. E. J. Reagan of McDonough, and Mrs. J. A. George of Atlanta. These two daughters will be in charge of the unveiling coremonies.

Mr. and Mrs. Lyon, members of two of DeKalb's earliest families, were for many years two of the county's outstanding citizens, and both took prominent parts in the early history of Midway Ohurch.

Mr. Lyon was the founder of the church and its ruling elder.

He was born in 1822 and died in 1895.

Mrs. Lyon, who before her marriage was Miss Helen Gathright, was born in 1833, and died in 1925.

The program for the service on September 23 will be given principally by descendants of the esteemed couple.

Judge Frank Reagin, of Macon, and Edward L. Reagan of McDonough, former state senator, will speak.

Edward Lyon, a grandson, and George Lyon JJJ, and Helen Crumbley, great grand children, will be on the program, also.

Among the descendants of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Lyon were Wallace Lyon and Joseph Lyon, both deceased, and L. P. Lyon, who is living in New Mexico, Miss Kate Reagan, a sister of Judge Frank Reagan, is a teacher in the Atlanta schools, and Dr. Roy George, another descendant, is a well known Georgian.

George Lyon still lives in the original homestead on South river.

Churches. Ford, Elizabeth austin Church, Midway Presbyterian.

<u>Midway Presbyterian Church</u> written for (and at the request of) The De Kalb County Historical Society by Elizabeth Austin Ford October, 1950

In 1874, in that wide area of De Kalb County, east of Decatur toward Lithonia, there were a number of people having to travel bong distances to obtain the benefits of Church service. They might go to the Decatur Presbyterian Church, to Mesley Chapel Methodist, or to Indian Creek Baptist, but in the days of the horse and buggy, this meant a long and tiresome journey, oftentimes cold and sometimes wet. So, Midway Union Sunday School was organized on May 17, 1874.

An early member of the Sunday School thinks that the organization was named for Old idway on the coast. It is more likely that it acquired the name because it is nearly midway between the other Churches.

There was, in the community, a one-room school house. In this tiny mulding, those interested persons met and organized. A partial list of those present at the organization follows. I say a partial list because no one now knows, exactly, who were the first members. This list was given me by one of those present in 1874:

They were members of other Churches and would, therefore, attend where they were members. The Austins, Morgans, Shymates, Egowns, Hudgins, Whites, and others attended Midway regularly.

John Cooper Austin was elected first superintendent. No had come to DakKalb County from Fouth Carolina when De Kalb was first opened to settlement. His plantation reached almost to the very doors of the // little school where services were to be held. His son, Thomas, was the first chorister and his grandson, John Russel Austin, was instrumental in acquiring material for the first building. The Austins were Episcopalians, and they had hopes of having an opiscopal Church there as well as a Sunday School. These hopes were not to be realized.

De Kalb County was then strongly Presbyterian. The Episcopal Church was still somewhat in disfavor. On July 29, 1876, the Commission of the Atlanta Presbytery met at Midway to organize a Presbyterian Church. Members were received; Midway Presbyterian Church came into being and the Union Sunday School passed into oblivion.

Hrs. M.V. Brown came from the Augusta Church; Mrs. H. C. Shumate came from Hountain Creek; Mrs. Martha Chase from the M.E. Church.

The Austins and others, who had found no church of their donomination, joined the Midway Church and became Presbyterians. The first elders were: Joseph Morgan, M.L. Shumate, T.E. Collier The first deacons were: David Morgan And C. W. McGinnis.

An acre of land adjoining the tiny schoolhouse plot was acquired for the site of the Church. Members began working toward the construction of a building. This was just eleven years after Shorman went through the section burning his path to the sen. The people had not even begun to recover from the destructive hands of the yankees and carpetbaggers. To build a church was then quite an undertaking. The children brought eggs to be sold for the fund; there were suppors and gifts; in numerous ways the money was acquired and the building erected.

For the first structure, the material was a mixture of concrete, sand, and rocks, similar to tabby. This old building was just to the rear of the present Church and situated in a grove of splendid oaks on a gentle rise, and on what is now Midway Road just off the Covington Road. Then a roadway went on past the Church to the east. This road has been abandoned and closed. There is still there, the road leading southward. This first building was no erude structure but was of church-like proportions with thick walls and high collings. Twy clung to the clay-coloured walls in the shade of great oaks, and the Church took on beauty and dignity.
