HISTORY OF THE SOMANS MISSIONARY SOCIETY

According to all records available the first Womans Missionary Society of Stone Mountain Baptist Oburch was organized in March 1894. First meeting hald on March 16th. Constitution dram up, Ar a particular interast, we give this Constitution, word for word, because with very few changes it stands as the same to the present day.

The Constitution is as follows:

1; This shall be called the Momans Missionary Society of Stone Mountain Baptist Church.

21 Its object shall be, by prayer, contributions, and the spread of information, to aid the Home, Foreign, and Sunday School Boards of the Southern Naptist Convention in giving the Gospel to the dostitute in our own, and heathen lands.

- 3: Anyone may become a member by attending the meetings, when possible. - praying for the Gause of Missions. and contributing five (5) conte a meeth, or as the may be able.
- 4: The officers shall be a President, Vice President, Scoretary and a Treasurer, who, together shall constitute a Standing Countities on business connected with the Society.
- 5: All money raised by this Society shall be reported and paid quarterly by the Freasurer to the Central Committee located at who will forward the same as divided by the Society.
- 6; The Constitution may be altered or amended by a twothirds majority of the members present at any Annual Meeting.

Previous to the erganization of the Komma Missionary Society a group of women had worked in the Church as a Ladies Aid Society. Feeling the need for expansion, the field of Missions supplied a well rounded Church Life. Under the guidance of Mrs. N.H. Mattox, the first President, records show that the Society was notive in every phase of the work. The causes studied and contributed to then are: Orphans Home, Sick and Needy, Frontier Work, Foreigh, and Homes and State Missions - these are the same that we are working for today. These Drothers contributed monthly to Mission thru the Society. It is interesting to note, in lookingover old minutes, that our beloved Brotherd.R.Wells, was often pressuit at the meetings, encouraging every good Cause that would help the Church.

It is fitting to mention here a few fucts about the first Freeidant. Mrs. Mattex, She served as President from 1894 to 1899, giving freely of her time and money, working always side by side with members, bravely and cheerfully taking up any Cause, no matter how great or small. Her life was full of good works and prayers, being a Christiab example for all who knew her. Her lasting influence is seen in the fact that from her family there has been an active member of the Womans Mission Society every year from them up to the present time.


Stone Mountain Baptist Tabernacle will celebrate its 86th anniversary/homecoming on Sunday, Sept. 3.
