'THAT OLD ROCK?'

Mountain for Rifle? Grandpa Said No

When Jesse Lanford came to Georgia by covered wagon back in the early days following the Revolutionary War, he carried his trusty Kentucky long rifle at his side.

He wasn't about to part with the faithful muzzle - loader when he was offered a mountain in exchange.

Mrs. E. D. Jordan, his granddaughter, smiles over the old story handed down through the family along with the gun.

"Times were mighty hard then and my grandfather said, 'I can kill a rabbit or get something to eat with this gun, what would I do with that old rock?'"

MRS. JORDAN, who has lived all of her 85 years within sight of that old rock — called Stone Mountain — was given the gun by her father, Elsberry Clinton Lanford, a Confederate veteran. She in turn has passed it on to her son, W. A. Jordan, 1020 Shepard Road, Stone Mountain. A notation on the gun indicates it was made in Germany in 1798.

Mrs. Jordan's memory of the mountain goes back a long way. She can recall when a stage coach used to meet the train and take visitors out to see the sights.

She remembers it in its wild state, a place for picnics and muscadine hunts. She climbed it just once, shortly after her marriage, before nine children came along. She remembers how good and cold the water was in a spring at the base.

Mrs. Jordan grew up east

of the huge granite outcropping near the spot where the new Mountain Park Methodist Church now stands. She went to school in a schoolhouse near Lilburn in Gwinnett County.

She was Mary Clinton Lanford in those days and she wore pinafores and carried a slate and her father built her a round desk with four legs and a hinged top for her use in school. It now serves as a table in the kitchen of her apartment in the Jordan home.

SHE RECALLS well that old one-room schoolhouse. "There was a chimney at each end and the boys sat at one end and the girls at the other with the teacher's desk in between."

There she met her future husband, Eli Daniel Jordan. "He was so smart in math. I wasn't. I'd have to go to the board with my fractions and he'd just sit back and gaze at me," she says, her eyes dancing.

Her husband grew up to serve the town of Stone Mountain as mayor for several terms and serve on the draft board in World War II.

On Mrs. Jordan's mantel is her husband's gold pocket watch encased in a glass bell. On the back is inscribed, "To our esteemed citizen E. D. Jordan from the residents of Stone Mountain." By her bed hangs a presidential citation for his wartime work.

THE JORDANS celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary in 1948. Mr. Jordan died in 1953.

Along with these mementos are those of her father and mother. She has the buttons from her father's Confederate

uniform and the Cross of Honor awarded him, as well as his New Testament and pieces from his white wedding suit and her mother's flowered wedding dress.

Of the mountain today she says, "I wish my husband and my father could see it."

She would have liked to see the mountain remain "as God made it" without the carving, but she thinks the accommodations for visitors are fine.

She can remember the days when if you were hungry or needed a place to stop for the night you had to ask at the nearest cabin.

She recalls such a trip to North Georgia when she was a child. She and her family were fed hoe cake, shoulder meat and gravy when they stopped at a log house.

SOMEONE recently brought her corn meal ground at the

up and down steps. Instead, she reads the Bible and stitches pads for the American Cancer Society.

Another favorite pastime is baking cookies for her grandchildren, she has 21, and also for her great-grandchildren, who number 19 if she has counted correctly, she says.

Her sons and daughters are Mrs. S. H. Nuckolls, Mrs. A. C. Partee, the late J. C. Jordan, Mrs. W. E. Avery, Mrs. W. B. Roberts, W. A.

Jordan, Mrs. W. S. Smith, H. S. Jordan and J. L. Jordan, all of whom live not far from the mountain.

Only one of her 65 kin is







Captain William Beauchamp was born Oct. 22, 1805 and died Jan. 24, 1853 in Stone Mountain, Ga. He was the son of old William who was born in Worcester County, Md. in 1760.

Martha Parker was born 9/15/1805 in Ds. She was still living in DeKalb County on Rays road in 1870. She was an only child of Isaiah and Lucy Parker.

Born 1/5/1820 died 2/19/1863. He was a rail road engineer, and died in Chunky River, Miss when his engine went thru a trestle.

A 1880 census shows David (D.L. Odom, b. ca 1858) arrived to Ella —, with a son, Richard in an Atlanta, Ga. census. Will try to do his & Josephine's next. If Grandpa Odom died between 1880 & 1900, then it is not him buried in the Confederate section of Oakland Cemetery. The 1910 census shows Rebecca as having borne 4 children, 3 living. David (D.L.) died in 1903. J.B.B. - 1971
