my father was born in Ivedell County, n. C. So was my mother, in October, not a months difference in their ages, but I have heard

Hem say they did not know which was the older. I will take my mother first as she died first. She was Sarah Me Curry. She warried in 1811 and died in 1863, on the 18th of april, being 76 years and five months old.

my father died the 15th day of August, 1868, in his 81th year.

my father father was Filbert Gordon who married mary

Me Kenzie. She was first 12 years old when they married and he

was 30. He made her a little Cedar piggin and that made her fall

in love with him. They Came from Scotland after they were morried.

My mothers father was named angus Me Curry and her mother was

Flora Me Longal at first, but she married a Me Honald and he and

she had one child named Brory when Me Honald died. after a

reasonable time she married my Grandfather, angus Me Curry,

and they had two daughters, margaset and Sarah. The latter

was my mother. She always claimed that her right name was marion, but my Grandfather could not translate the Gaelie into English. You see I am full-blooded Scotch. my father and mother were married on the 29th of January, 1811. I was born on the 29th of January, 1832, so you see I am 75 years and some months old. There were ten children: Gilbert, West, Thomas, mary, Flora, Eleanor, Angus, John, Robert and margaret. I am the only one of the family living. I wrote a little family history a flew years ago to Sarah Halloway. Tive my love to all and accept a good share for yourself. and wiley, Kiss the Children for me. Your true aunt, I. M. His daughters blank had to sit with the family and read the Bible on Sunday afternoons, These people settled about 10 miles southlost of wholis now Hostwell, Georgia and forded the Savannah River to attend services at the Little Generostes Church. a number of the Grondsons became noted Fresbyterian

ministers including Filbert Gordon, West Fordon and Lauchlin M2 Honold.

Some of the larlier spelling of Mic Honold was mor Honald, I have heard that the D. A. R. has exected a morker of some type to Angus Mic Curry, If that is true he must have been in the Ber, was but I have found no record.

I have found no Connection between Hilbert Fordon and the Fordons mentioned in my book, However I am working on a Chart of that family from the beginning through the Rev. wor. Of you live in the same fort of north Carolina as they did I will send you a Copy if you should want it.

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53. COTTEN-GORDON—Can you tell me the ancestors of George W. Cotten, born in Charleston, S. C., probably between 1780 and 1790? He was married twice. His second wife was Miss Rebecca Pennington. By this marriage there were two children—Julia C. and James K. James K. married a Miss Sarah W. Reid near Crawfordville, Ga. They had quite a large family.

I wish particularly to know of the revolutionary record of Gilbert Gordon. He was a Scotchman, born in the Highlands; emigrated to America and with his wife settled in North Caro-

lina. Gilbert is said to have been on General Washington's staff in the Revolutionary War. In this conflict he fought against his own brother, who came over with the British army.

Not until after the war was ended did they discover this, however. About this time he moved to Georgia and settled either in Elbert or Wilkes county. I think he is buried in Washington, Wilkes county.

After Gilbert's death the younger children of his family were left with Governor Erwin, of Georgia, until the older ones could provide a home for them. Gilbert had four daughters and three sons, I think. Their names were, viz: Julia Elizabeth, Eleanor, Flora, Mary, Thomas and two sons whose names I do not know. Julia Elizabeth married Archibald Johnson, a Scotchman. They had a large family.
