

From the Petersburg Express Dec 30

Died, in Petersburg, Va., on Sunday, Dec. 21, 1862 of a wound received in ^{the} battle of Fredericksburg on the 13th December, Lieut. Henry C. Banner, of Company K, 48th Reg't. N. C. Troops, aged 23 years.

For several weeks before, and also after the battles before Richmond, he was stationed with his regiment near Petersburg, and became acquainted with many citizens, of whom he used to speak in terms of kindness and affection.

He was a dutiful son and affectionate brother, a faithful friend, a kind neighbor, and a good citizen.

As an officer, he deserved and won the love of those below, and the respect of those above him in military rank. By much exposure and fatigue, amid the heats of summer and the frosts of winter, in the camp, at the bivouac, and on the march over mountains and through swamps and rivers, his fortitude was severely tried and never found wanting. Amid the perils of battles on the Chickahominy, at Manassas, in Maryland, and on the Rappahannock, his courage attracted the notice and received the praise of his commanders. A true soldier and a gallant gentleman, diligent in the performance of all his duties, patient and cheerful under sufferings, and brave in the face of danger, he fell, as the patriot loves to fall when his time comes in the path of honor,

amidst the strife of battle and in the hour of
victory.

Lieut. H. C. Banner. It again becomes our
painful duty to announce the death of a young
man, — a friend and neighbor, — who gallantly
fell in defence of his country. Lieut. H. C. Banner
of Co. H., 48th Regt. N.C.T., the youngest son of
C. L. Banner, Esq., died at Petersburg from a
wound received in the battle of Fredericksburg.
His father and sister arrived at Petersburg a short
time before he breathed his last, and accompanied
his remains home. Lieut. Banner was the
intimate friend and neighbor of Lieut. Shepperd
whose death was announced last week. Both
now sleep in our beautiful "Woodland Cemetery"
Lieut. Shepperd beside his sainted mother, and
Lieut. Banner next to his departed sister.

Camp of Cook's Brigade
near Fredericksburg Va

At a meeting of the officers of the 48th N. C. Reg^t, called for the purpose of expressing their feelings at the death of Lt. H. L. Banner, Capt. L. A. W. Turner was called to the chair, Capt. J. H. Mabry was requested to act as Secretary, and Capt. W. H. Jones, Lt. W. H. H. Lawhon and Lt. M. D. Blegg were appointed a Committee of Resolutions, to which the Chairman and Secretary were afterwards added, who reported the following which were unanimously adopted:—

Whereas, Lt. Henry L. Banner of Co. K, was mortally wounded in the battle of 3rd Dec, while bravely urging his men forward in the fight, and whereas we think it just and proper in consideration of the high standing the deceased occupied amongst us, to express our respect for his memory and sympathy with his friends— Therefore

Resolved That we have learned with deep regret of the death of Lt. Henry L. Banner, Co. K, 48th N. C. Reg^t, at Petersburg, Va. from a wound received in the battle of Fredericksburg, Va. on the 3rd Dec. 1862.

That by his death this Regiment has lost an accomplished literary gentleman, a brave and skillful officer, and a kind and sociable friend.

Resolved That we sincerely sympathise with the family and friends of the deceased in this our common loss, and feel that it will be hard to find one who can worthily fill his place in our social or military circle.

Resolved That a copy of these Resolutions be sent to the family of the deceased, and that they be also published in the Peoples and Western Sentinel.

Lieut J Sheppard, who fell on the
same day - Genl Pender telegraphed

Wade Hampton III, son of Wade Hampton II and Anne Fitzsimmons, b 3/28/1818, d 4/11/1902. Lieut General CSA, 1861-65, Governor of S.C. 1876-79, United States Senator 1879-91. m Margaret Preston 10/10/3 (1818-1852)

Wade Hampton IV, son of Wade Hampton III, b 1849. Lieutenant Confederate Army. Wounded in a battle in which his father also participated. d 12/22/1879.

Ann Wynn Bynum, daughter of Gray Bynum and Margaret Hampton Bynum, b 9/22/1779, d 6/1/1843, married 2/2/1799 to Dr. Andrew Bowman, who was born in Ireland 8/12/1772, obtaining his M.D. degree at Trinity College, Dublin, Ireland and moved to Stokes County, N.C. He died 2/22/1845. His family name was originally Beaumont. They were Hug. no's who fled from France to Ireland. Ann Wynn Bynum's brother was Judge William Preston Bynum, Chief Justice of the North Carolina Supreme Court at Charlotte, N.C.

Mary Bowman, eldest child and daughter of Dr. Andrew Bowman and Ann Wynn Bynum, b 2/22/1800, d 3/24/1890. On August 7, 1827 she married Constantine Ladd Banner, b 1/14/1799, d 8/5/1867. He was a Planter and Surveyor. His ancestors are as follows:

1. Henry Banner, b 1715, d 1805, m Eliza.
2. Joseph Banner, son of Henry, b 12/25/1749, d 1835. married Sarah McAnally 5/16/1771. Buried in Germanton, N.C. He served with Wm. Malcolm's Regiment in American Revolution, using the sword which is now in possession of George M. Everhart III, it having been given his father Lay H. by his grandmother Everhart.
3. Charles Banner, son of Joseph and Sarah Banner, b 9/3/1773, d 9/21/1859. He was a Captain in War of 1812, using Joseph Banner's sword. He married Rebecca Ap-Jones Evans 1/25/1798. She was born 8/13/1776, d 5/4/1856.
4. Constantine Ladd Banner, son of Charles and Rebecca Ap-Jones Banner, b 1/14/1799, d 8/5/1867. He married Mary Bowman on Aug. 7, 1827.

2. Cornelia Adelaide Banner, daughter of Constantine Ladd and Mary Bowman Banner. b 8/24/1830 in Stokes County N.C. d 8/20/1916 in

3. Emily Eugenia Banner, daughter of Constantine Ladd and Mary Bowman Banner, b 12/9/1832, d 1/23/1887 in Jeffersonville, Ga. On May 7, 1857 she married Archibald McCallum, b d 10/15/1876. Their children were;

6. Henry Clay Banner, 6th child and son of Constantine Ladd and Mary Bowman Banner, b 6/11/1839, d 12/21/1862 from head wound received at Battle of Fredericksburg, Va. on 12/13/62. He died at Peversturg, Va. He was a Lieutenant in Co. K, 48th N.C. Regt, CSA. He was the third to use Joseph Banner's sword.

Note: See The Everhart Line for Marriage of Cornelia Adelaide Banner to George Marlow Everhart in Salem, N.C. on June 7, 1853.

The Banner family moved from Stokes Co. N.C. to Salem, N.C. in 1842. All of them except James Bowman Banner are buried in Salem Cemetery and also George M. and Cornelia A. Everhart, with their children George M. II and Ethel and Henry Banner Everhart.
