

In grappling with DeKalb's remembrances of the Confederacy, communities have removed statues (the Confederate monument in downtown Decatur), renamed roads (Confederate Avenue), and remained unsure about a granite carving of Lee, Jackson, and Davis, which is far too large to store in a museum.

It is a 15-mile road flanked by two jails that begins at Georgia's gleaming gold "Capitol of Dixie" dome and ends at Stone Mountain's Confederate Hall.

I have many memories as a child growing up in Stone Mountain. One of my earliest memories is being in the car, riding through town and seeing, on either side of Main Street, people in white robes and pointy white hats, waving papers and signs in the air.

I remember being completely terrified. Fast forward several years and I'm a teenager, "cruising" around Stone Mountain Park with my friends and playing putt-putt. I also worked at the park for a time. Those were happy, care-free days! I was unaware of the history and the impact of the carving on the mountain and the confederate flags around the park. It would be years later that I would learn the disturbing truths of those things and how they related to the white robes I saw as a girl.

Some things have not changed, but some things have and are changing. Fast forward again to November 2019 and the city of Stone Mountain votes to rename Venable Street. It is now named for Eva Jewell Greene and Mamie Ella Lane (Eva Mamie Lane), a mother-daughter duo considered pillars of Shermantown, the historically African American community in Stone Mountain. Fast forward once more to 2020 and the Stone Mountain Action Coalition is working with the Stone Mountain Memorial Association "to make the park and its surroundings and exhibits more welcoming, inclusive, and historically accurate." We look forward to what comes next! New memories to be added...






