Info on Phyllis Schwartz

Phyllis' first official involvement with Decatur was as the Chair of the DeKalb Teen Pregnancy Task Force.

She expanded her role in Decatur in 1989 when she initiated, along with Karen Davenport, the Oakhurst Project, whose aim it was to improve and coordinate services for families through an interagency network.

In 1990, Phyllis received the American Medical Association national Congress on Adolescent Health Award for Excellence in Prevention in Comprehensive Health Education and Prevention programs for the Oakhurst Project.

The Oakhurst Project was expanded in 1991 to the Oakhurst Initiative through funding from the United Way of Metro Atlanta. This allowed for expanded services in the Oakhurst and Fifth Avenue community.

Since then, Phyllis has continued to work to improve services for Decatur's children and families. She has been instrumental in forming a variety of (sometimes unlikely), partnerships that have made Decatur a better place to be a kid.
