Mr. Slack was a University of Georgia and Harvard graduate, who joined the Georgia Highway Department, now the Department of Transportation, in 1920. He was its first bridge engineer, according to the DOT personnel division,

However, Mr. Slack and other engineers were fired and evicted from their offices by National Guardsmen on orders of Talmadge in July 1933 in a bitter dispute over control of the department and its spending practices. Talmadge later appointed his own engineers. The governor also fired Highway Board and Public Service Commission members and briefly declared martial law at the state Capitol that
