Pleasantdale Elementary School

Pleasantdale Elementary School, located at 3695 North Lake Drive, Doraville, was opened in the fall of 1968. Mr. Charlie Iddins served as principal from 1968 through June, 1978. During Mr. Iddins tenure as principal, Pleasantdale's enrollment grew to a high of 707 students in 1977. Also during this time various specialized educational programs, as well as enrichment programs, were begun to improve and enhance the students' educational development.

The 1977-1978 school term began with a change in the leadership for the first time since the school opened. Mr. James Chivers was named as the new principal and remained until his retirement in July, 1997. During his leadership, Pleasantdale continued to experience many exciting new educational programs. In the fall of 1978, the first kindergarten class was welcomed. Another exciting program was the addition of ESL in 1985. As DeKalb's population became more international, so did the need to support students with various language background. The newest educational program was begun in 1995 known as Prekindergarten. This program is funded through Lottery money and there is currently only one class per school.

During Mr. Chivers' tenure as principal, Pleasantdale experienced a declining enrollment reaching a low of 252 students in 1981-1982. However, new housing developments in the area have had a tremendous impact on the school population and in 1992, two mobile classrooms were necessary to relieve overcrowding. By the end of 1997 a total of four mobile classrooms were needed.

In the July, 1997, for only the third time in twentynine years, Pleasantdale welcomed a new principal--Mrs. Carol Reams. Pleasantdale's student population has topped 700 and has seven mobile classrooms for the current school term. Rich with cultural diversity and focused on the future, Pleasantdale continues to serve the needs of its community.



Mrs. Sebastian's daughter, Carla, received the science award at Pleasantdale graduation last year and attends Henderson High School. Her son, Greg, was graduated with honors from Henderson and attended Georgia Tech this year. Her husband is a financial planner.
