The summer months provide a unique educational opportunity for Smoke Rise parents and students to share a computer-oriented learning experience.

Two ten-hour minicourses, from 8 to 10 a.m., Monday through Friday during a two-week period, are the "brain child" of Smoke Rise parent Chandler Bridges, a DeKalb at-

torney.

Bridges, himself an individual with a keen interest in computers, has developed the minicourse content and will serve as instructor. He views as highly beneficial the idea of parents and children learning together, This idea has met with lively response from the Smoke Rise community. Thirty-six parents with their children have enrolled so far.

Both ten-hour minicourses - the first running from June 21 through July 2 and the second during the opening two weeks of August - focus on "An Introduction to Microcomputer Usage." Bridges has developed a math program and a telephone directory program as teaching-learning experiences.



The competition was sponsored by the American Citizen's division of the Daughters of the American Revolution and included five categories: poem, stamp, essay, banner, and poster.


The first place individual award in poetry went to Clay Miller; in essay, to Liz Dorsey; and for stamp, to Lauren Wech.

National honor for Smoke Rise principal

Smoke Rise Elementary School principal Harold Beaver is the state's top choice for this year's National Distinguished Principal award.

Beaver, who has been principal of the Stone Mountain school since 1999, travels to Washington in October to receive the honor.

The award is sponsored by the National Association of Elementary School Principals and the U.S. Department of Education.

Since 1984, the award has recognized elementary and middle school principals who exhibit extraordinary leadership and commitment to the school's faculty and student body.

Beaver was selected after a statewide search by the Georgia Association of

Elementary School Principals.

GAESP was impressed with what it describes as exemplary instructional practices, such as Beaver's active role in practices, such as Beaver's active role in developing the school's curriculum, his strong interpersonal skills and his emphasis on learning.

"I'm excited," said Beaver, "It's one of the things you never expect, but when you get it, you're humbled by it."

Beaver has been in education 30 years beginning as a teacher five years.


years, beginning as a teacher five years at Wadsworth Elementary in Decatur.

He also was principal at Gwinnett County schools W.C. Britt Elementary and Brookwood Elementary, which he opened, and assistant principal at Bethesda Elementary in Lawrenceville.

The 51-year-old Snellville resident is a graduate of the University of Georgia and Western Carolina University and is married with three children.

"As adults, we need to teach them how to be good citizens: How to say, 'Yes ma'am' and 'no ma'am,' 'yes sir' and 'no sir' and personal responsibility," said Beaver. "That way, they can become a responsible citizen when they get out into society.'
