
Snapfinger Elementary School opened its doors for the first time in the autumn of 1964 with a staff of fifteen teachers. Since that time, it has increased in population and size to embrace 1200 students and more than 100 faculty members, making it one of the largest schools in the DeKalb County School System. It is also one of the few schools to offer instruction to students from pre-kindergarten through seventh grade. The Magnet Program at Snapfinger provides an enriched curriculum of foreign language, mathematics, science, and technology studies for students in grades four through seven.

The philosophy at Snapfinger Elementary School states that every child can learn regardless of personal circumstance or ability level, and every effort is made to assist students in achieving their instructional goals. This effort involves not only the staff, faculty, and administration of the school, but also members of the community and our adopters, Kaiser Permanente.

Snapfinger Elementary was recognized as A Georgia School of Excellence in 1994, and as a National Drug Free School in 1995. Shari Britner, a seventh grade science teacher was the first teacher in DeKalb County to receive National Teacher Certification.



DeKalb's Crawford Lewis receives national honors

DeKalb County - Snapfinger Elementary Principal Crawford Lewis ought to be used to awards.

His school, which houses a science and technology magnet program, has been honored as one of the top 21 math and science schools in the Southeast and as a Georgia School of Excellence and a national Program of Excellence.

He himself was named the DeKalb County School System's Principal of the Year for 1993-94.

Yet Lewis never experienced anything like the events of last Thursday. The next day, using words like "stunned" and "incredible," he was still smiling about the \$25,000 National Educator Award he received from the Milken Foundation.

Surprise announcement

State Superintendent of Education Werner Rogers had cooked up an elaborate scheme to surprise Lewis with the award.

In arranging the presentation, his staff told Lewis a misleading yarn about the superintendent's wanting to tour Snapfinger as part of a kickoff to the new school year.

"I was totally in the dark," said Lewis.

When the tour group, which included DeKalb officials and six Snapfinger teachers, reached their final stop, at the school's media center, Rogers said, "Let me tell you why we're really here" and presented Lewis with the award.

Lewis has not quite decided how he will spend the \$25,000, but he's certain he won't be buying a car he received a brand new Toyota Camry when he was named Principal of the Year last year.

Educational 'investments'

He said he intends to put some of the money back into the school, perhaps by purchasing media-center equipment or setting up an outdoor classroom, but before making any decision he will seek input from teacher and student committees.

"I want to find a way everybody can benefit," he said.

In addition to investing in the school, Lewis is also considering a personal expenditure to furnish his family's recently purchased Stone Mountain home.

In his three years at Snapfinger, Lewis has spearheaded development of an honors program, along with new clubs for students interested in computers, French, drama, 4-H, and Junior Beta. All these clubs needed leaders, so he started a program to train students to become effective leaders.

Lewis was quick to share credi for his and the school's accomplish ments: "I have the best group o teachers that a principal could hop to work with. They are profes sional, they are creative, and the help me make decisions and char the course for the school.'

He also cited the student body and Snapfinger's strong PTA, which ha to meet on two nights because of th crowds.

Even though at 40 his career i going very well, Lewis has furthe ambitions. He said he would like to move up to the school system' central office, and mentioned tha the idea of becoming a superintend ent has crossed his mind.

Since graduating from Clark Col lege in 1977, he has never veere from his career in elementary edu cation. He was a tea cher at Mont gomery Elementary School befor becoming assistant principal in 198 and principal in 1984. Lewis becam Snapfinger'a principal in 1990.

While teaching and working as a administrator, he earned complete three graduate degrees: a master' degree in education at Georgia Stat University in 1981; a specialist i education degree in 1985 at GSU and a Ph.D. in education in 1990.




