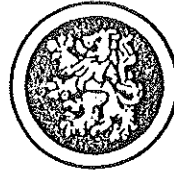

Subject: Family Puzzlers / May 31 1984

I notice that you are seeking information on Meredith Brown. You probably already have the material in my records. Here is the ancestry of Meredith Brown (usually listed as Meredith G. Brown).

Merdeith G. Brown drew land in the Land Lottery of 1827 as a resident of Dekalb County.

Mary Glover Brown drew land in the Land Lottery of 1838 as a widow of a Revolutionary Soldier.

Mary Brown was a resident of Mobley's District, DeKalb Co in 1838. There is a medallion on the grave of Meredith G. Brown for Revolutionary War and for War of 1812 with Great Britain. He is buried in Old Elam Cemetary, Forest Park, Clayton (after 1859) County. I assume that his spouse is also buried there without marker. Their son John Brown II, Soldier War of 1812 is also buried there. Meredith Brown had a brother Peter, but I am not sure he is the same Peter Brown listed in Family Puzzlers. I greatly admire your efforts.
