

OLD KLONDIKE BAPTIST CEMETERY.

Location: A short distance southeast of the village of Klondike, near junction of Klondike and Robinson Roads, Land Lot #144, 16th. District, DeKalb County Phillips' District.

Recorded October 17, 1931.

This old cemetery marks the site of the original Klondike Baptist Church, long since abandoned. Among several unmarked graves is one bearing an inscribed marker. It reads:

JAMES M. HOLLINGSWORTH
 Son of Aaron & Ruth Hollingsworth.
 Born June 1, 1831.
 Died Sept. 5, 1833.

Marshall Wright, an old settler of the Klondike section, told Franklin Garrett on October 17, 1931, that Hiram Sharp, who shot and killed his wife and was hanged for the crime, is buried in an unmarked grave in this cemetery.

Hells was on the witness stand yesterday and the testimony which he gave then in answer to the prosecution's rigid questioning was of a sensa-

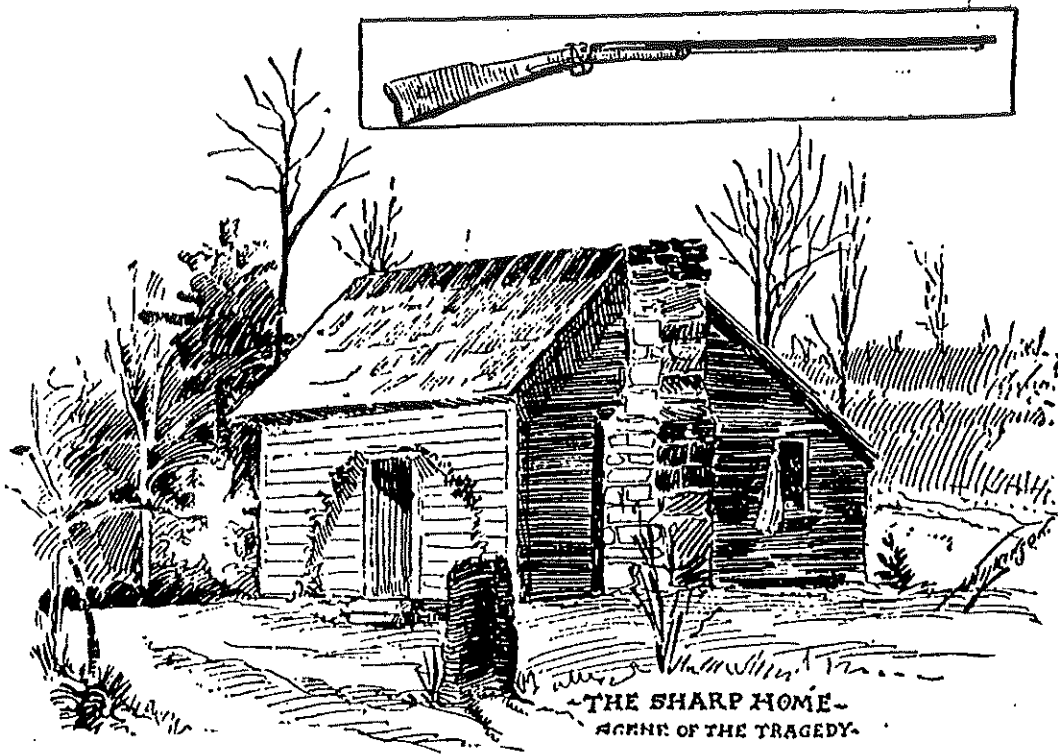

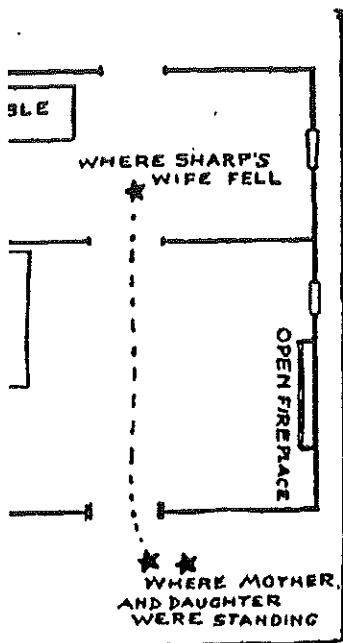
