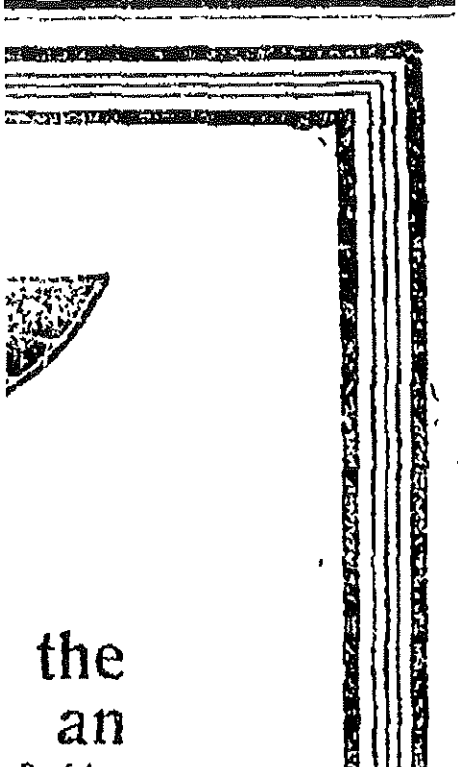

CREMATORY PLANS MUST BE EXTENSIVELY CHANGED

Capt. Clayton Says Specifications for the Building Are Not What They Should Be

In pursuance of a resolution adopted by general council Monday afternoon, Captain R. M. Clayton, chief of construction, has gone over the plans for the building to house the new crematory, and reports that he finds many changes that ought to be made.

The plans were drawn by the Designer company, which has the crematory contract, and Captain Clayton has addressed a six-page specification letter to the company suggesting changes.

Under the plans, states his letter, the walls will exert a pressure of 4,000 pounds to the square foot, whereas the city building code permits a pressure of only 250 pounds, and he suggests that the base of the walls be widened.

Other suggestions include changes in the doors and windows of the building, changes in the roof, changes in the framework and changes in the steel framework.

AGED BROTHERS WILL BE LAID TO REST TOGETHER

A double funeral will be held over the bodies of William and J. A. Webb, both brothers and both veterans of the Civil war, who died within two days of each other this week. James A. Webb, sixty-two years of age, passed away at 11:30 p. m. Saturday night at his residence, 808 Haskins street, and William H. Webb followed him at 10 o'clock Tuesday morning.

The latter was seventy-one years of age and had been living at 14 South Pine street. He leaves his wife, four sons, Walter, Alonzo, Guy and C. Webb, and a brother, George Webb.

The two brothers were born and reared in DeKalb county, where they spent most of their days. They fought during the war, and were close companions throughout life. It was in accordance with their own wishes that their bodies will be laid side by side in the soil of their old home near Oley chapel.

The bodies of both men were interred in Harry G. Peole's chapel to a double funeral, which will take place at Oley chapel at noon Wednesday.

Dr. Goss Resigns

NASHVILLE, Ga., Oct. 22.—Rev. A. Goss, pastor of the Baptist church on Sunday, delivered his farewell sermon on Sunday evening. The Methodist church suspended services. Mr. Goss will return to Alabama.

Tab to Be Kept on Voters

Through W. J. Harris, its chairman, the state executive committee has devised a method of keeping tab on voters who bolt the Democratic primary.

Organization of the Democratic political clubs will be printed on pink paper, and the election managers will be requested to keep a list of those participating in the presidential election on Nov. 6 who voted in the last Democratic primary. By this plan it is expected that no difficulty will be experienced in tracing those who bolt the primary. All such will be prohibited from voting in the next Democratic primary.

Even though a voter should feel the consent of his conscience to violate his Democratic primary obligation and greatly cast his ballot in the presidential election for the electors of another party, he will face discovery and exposure.

For a failure to vote, the pink ballot will be proof positive that he did not support the Democratic electors. It will be an easy matter to compare the voting lists of the primary with those of the national election and determine upon those who disregarded their primary pledges.

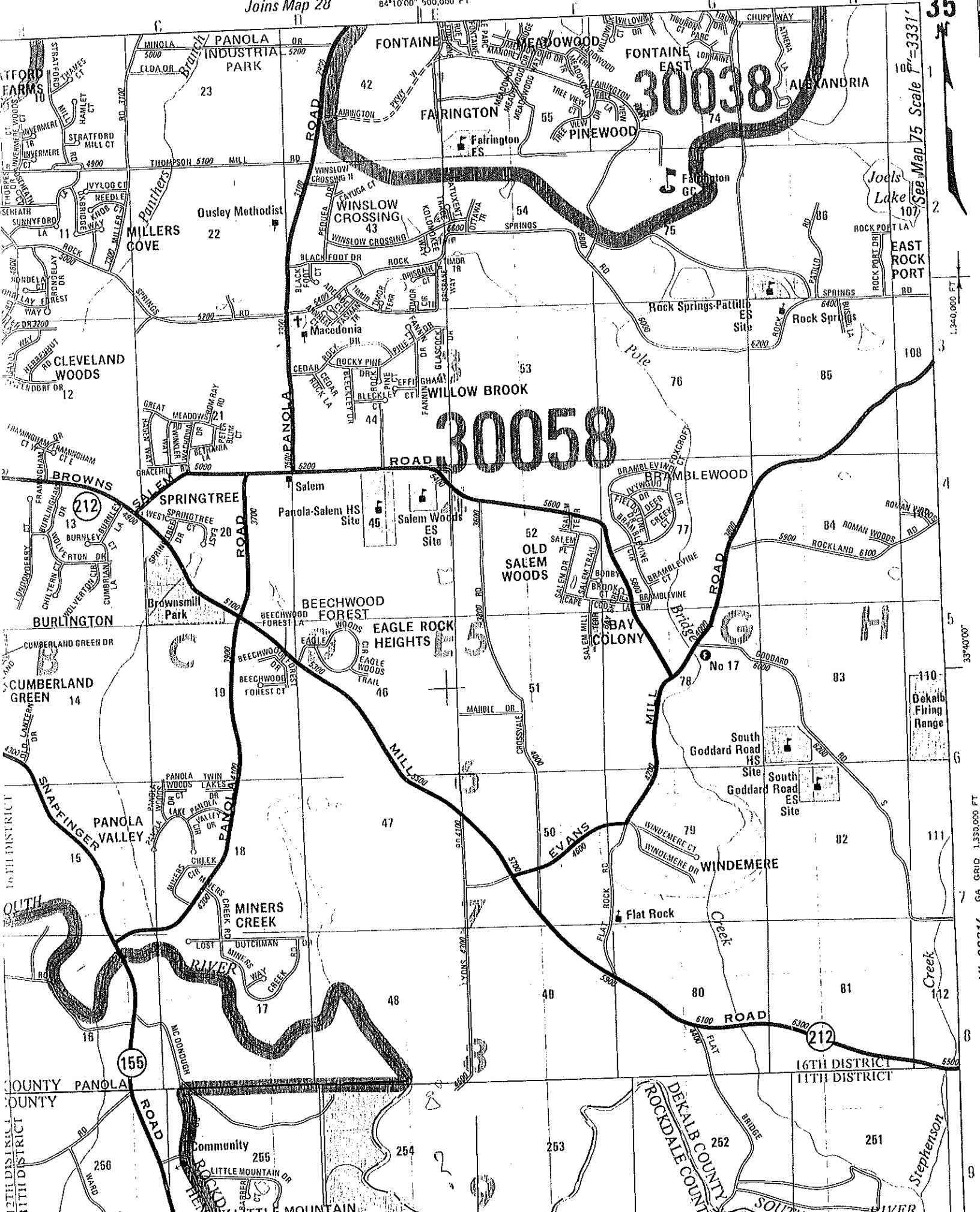

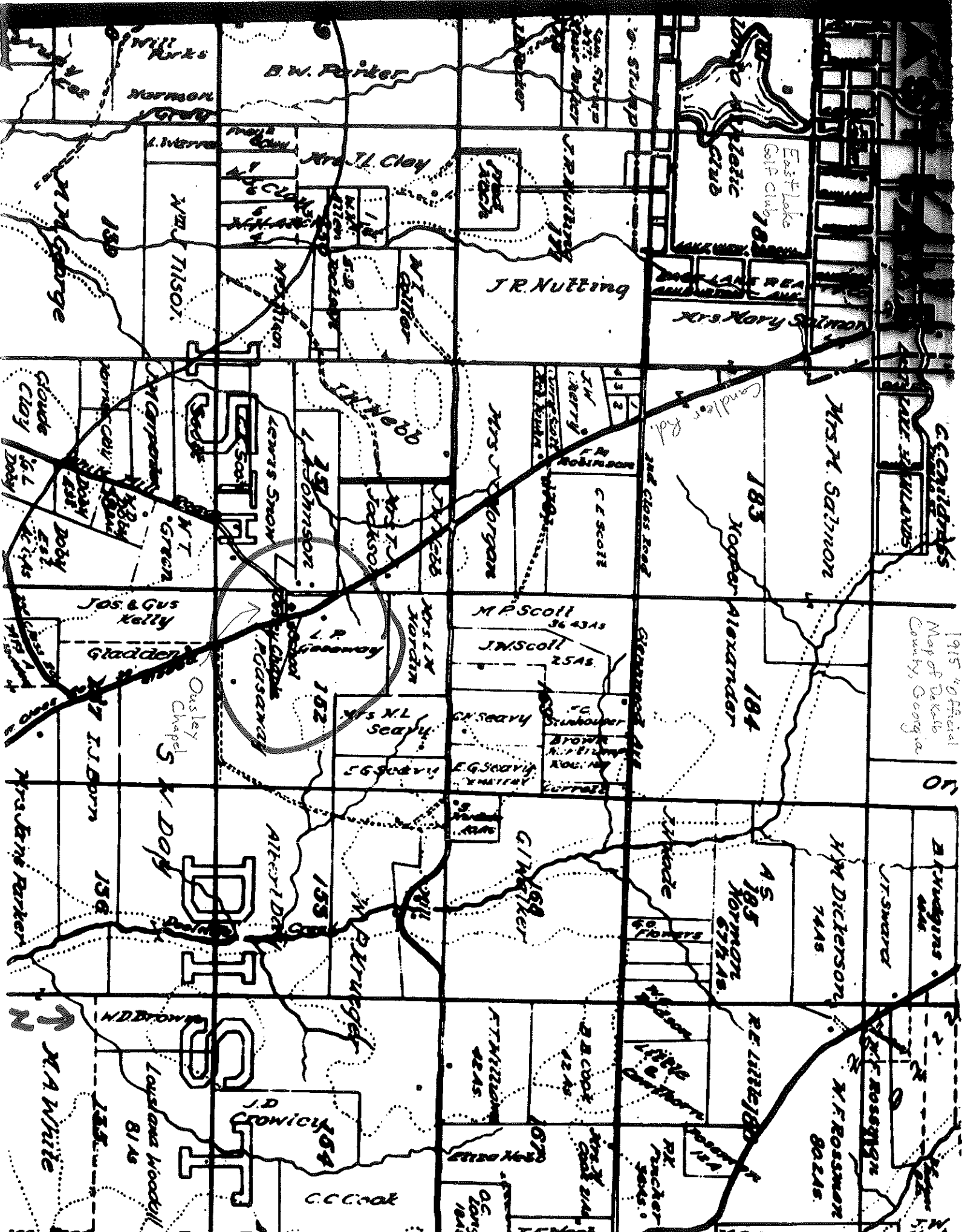
