Bassett Kindergarten Is DeKalb County Landmark

Thirty-four years ago a dedicated Decatur lady began kindergarten classes for her young son. Today the school she founded is the oldest established private kindergarten and nursery school in DeKalb County.

The Bassett Kindergarten and Nursery School located at 304 Sycamore Street in Decatur is now a DeKalb County landmark.

Mrs. Reba J. Bassett, founder and present director of the school, has touched the lives of thousands of DeKalb Countains. Today she teaches sons and daughters of some of her first pupils.

The school has been located at its present site since 1949. The first Bassett Kindergarten was located on Clairmont Avenue, Later the school was moved to 635 Sycamore Street and then to its present ad-

Mrs. Bassett was one of the first people in this area to see the need for early formal training for children. In 1929 she was faced with the decision to either move to Atlanta to provide kindergarten training for her son Hunter, who is now or open a kindergarten of her own. a former pupil,




