The first bank founded by m orities in Georgia since 1927 to another step toward solidifying position in the Atlanta market k week as the permanent facility First Southern Bank in Lithonia w dedicated.

The ribbon-cutting on the 10,21 square-foot building Nov. 28, atter ed by Gov. Joe Frank Harris a DeKalb Chief Executive Offic Manuel Maloof, marked the comination of a nearly three-ye process started by 16-year banki veteran Herbert K. Orise, Fin Southern's president and chief ecutive officer, who wanted to op a bank in a racially-mixed, midd to-upper income suburban comunity.

The bank officially opened April in a temporary facility behing its now permanent site on Pano Road at the intersection of Snajinger Woods Drive, after an 1 month, \$5 million capitalization drive completed in January.

"Lithonia was chosen because it a racially mixed community and the bank has a racially mixed board directors," said Felicia Moor spokesperson for First Souther "It's a thriving community; there a lot of development there."

'i'he market area First Southern targeting is Southeast DeKalb, wi a focus on small to medium-size businesses, individuals and pr fessionals. Among the services the bank will offer include a variety consumer and commercial checkin accounts, time deposits and commercial, real estate and installmet loans.

The permanent facility include six teller booths, a real estate closing room, three drive-throug banking windows and a drive-automatic teller machine.

Ms. Moore said there are rimmediate plans to expand Fir. Southern Bank but said expansic will probably come "once they gethis branch going."

Bank officials say they reached their \$5 million capitalization goal after an 18 month drive.



First Liberty Financial Corp. and Eagle Bancshares, the holding company of Tucker Federal Savings and Loan Association, agreed to a new purchase price for the proposed acquisition of Eagle Bancshares by First Liberty.
