## **Smith Family Papers**

**Scope and content:** The Smith Family Papers include photographs, books, letters, newspaper clippings, church bulletins, certificates, and honors collected by Judge Charles Whitefoord Smith and his wife, Mrs. Fannie Wright Smith, as well as their adopted daughter, Daisy Frances Smith. The Smith Family Papers span a period from 1800 to 1986, but the bulk of information runs from mid-1800s to 1900s. An individual folder on Judge Smith's death provides ample resources on his life's accomplishments and funeral/estate settlement.

Biographical Sketches of Daisy Frances Smith and Judge Charles Whitefoord Smith: Daisy Frances Smith was born in 1902 and was adopted by her aunt and uncle, Charles and Fannie Smith, after losing her mother at age six. Daisy attended the Girls High School in Atlanta, Agnes Scott College for her undergraduate work, and the University of Pennsylvania where she received a master's degree in history. She taught English at Agnes Scott College (Decatur, GA) and then Andrew College (Cuthbert, GA) as well as history at Peace College (Raleigh, NC). In 1932, Daisy organized the Decatur Girls High and served as principal for eleven years until she enlisted as a private in the U.S. Army Women's Army Corps. During this time, she was stationed in Florida, Texas, and Georgia; trained clerical workers in the army; and earned the position of Second Lieutenant. When discharged in 1945, Daisy returned to Decatur to find the Girls and Boys High Schools had merged, and she was not offered a position. Ms. Smith then chose a job with Esco's Garage and crossed gender barriers, wearing men's clothing and driving pick-up trucks. When the Escos left Decatur in the mid-1950s, Daisy took a teaching position at Hapeville High School. This later part of her life opened the doors for writing as she became a published poet. Her three volumes of poetry include the Half-Breed (1956), A Fig and a Fither (1967) and *Elegies* (1981). [These books are cataloged separately from this collection.] Charles Whitefoord Smith was born April 21, 1856 in Beaufort, South Carolina. Charles received his primary education from both public and private schools in Atlanta before attending Wofford College (Spartanburg, SC). At age nineteen Charles was admitted to the Georgia bar, and in 1876, he began practicing law. After almost fifty years of civil law, Charles Smith became judge of the Stone Mountain circuit in 1915. After serving for four years, Judge Smith

was appointed to the Georgia Court of Appeals by Governor Dorsey to serve an unexpired term until his death on May 1, 1923. Judge Charles Smith was also involved with public service, held membership with the Georgia state militia for eighteen years, and founded the Governor's Horse Guards with his law partner, Mr. Milledge. Futhermore, Judge Smith acted as chairman of the Democratic executive committee of DeKalb County and served as mayor of Edgewood. He held church positions at Epworth Church in Edgewood and the First Methodist Church in Decatur. Finally and among a much longer list of activities, Judge Charles Smith was a member of the American Bar Association. Charles Smith married in 1881 to Fannie Wright in Columbus, Georgia. She was a graduate of Wesleyan College (Macon, GA) and held special honors in music.

**Description:** The Smith Family Papers contain books of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries; both personal and private correspondence; portraits and photographs of travel; various newspaper clippings; and financial papers including wills, deeds, checks, and estate documentation. There are also devotional materials, sermons, family greetings, letters, comical writings, and church bulletins. The folder on legal documentation includes diplomas, wills, financial records, campaign cards, certificates, and honors. There are also many photographs, business and calling cards; and a scrapbook with selected newspaper clippings, illustrated pictures, and essays. A scrapbook with photographs and postcards from the family's vacations to Florida and the western United States is also here.
