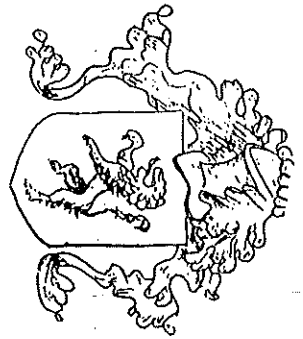

1-1 Robert Easley, Sr., a French Huguenot-refugee, came to Virginia via London, and is found in 1684 in Henrico Co. (Henrico Book 1677-92, p. 288), with his wife, Ann Parker Easley. Robert Easley being a French Huguenot makes all of his descendants eligible to join the Huguenot Society. He was apparently of the noble House of d'Escalls in Providence France. Ann Parker Easley was the daughter of William Parker and wife, Ann Powell. Ann Powell, daughter of Captain William Powell of London, who came to Virginia with Gov. Gates in 1611 and was a member of the first House of Burgesses, July 30, 1619 (Colonial Virginia Register by Standard, page 52; William & Mary Quarterly Volume VII, page 286). Ann Parker's grandfather, Captain William Powell, was son of William Powell of Southworks, Surry County, England.

From "The Cradle of the Republic", page 30, we quote: "As for Jamestown, Argall restored it once more, repaired church and cottages, and made William Powell Lieutenant Governor and Commander of Jamestown, the block houses and the people there". Descendants of these Powells are eligible for Colonial Dames and First Families of Virginia societies.

The first known of the Easley family is that they were Italian, Swiss merchants who migrated to France some five hundred years before they refueged to England.

Robert Easley, Sr., had a patent for 315 acres of land on Reedy Creek in 1704 for bringing 7 persons to dwell in the colony (Book 9, page 624), and he had a patent jointly with Thomas Jefferson, Thomas Turpin and John Archer for 1,500 acres on Pine Creek in Henrico County, which became Goodland in 1727, Cumberland in 1748, Powhatan since 1777, for bringing 18 people to dwell in the colony (Book 10, page 378).

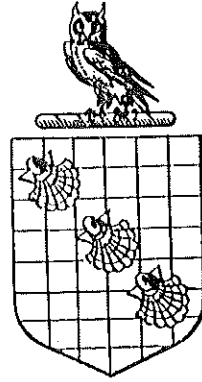
