

UDC Dedication for Confederate Veteran

On Sunday, March 26, 1995, Habersham Chapter #1237, United Daughters of the Confederacy dedicated a headstone and iron cross at the grave of Pvt. William Greenville Henderson. William was born in DeKalb County on October 27, 1838 and served in Company E, 7th Regiment, Georgia Volunteer Infantry, Army of Northern Virginia. He was the son of Thomas, born circa 1813, and Emily Willard Henderson, born 1822, who had married September 7, 1836 in Morgan County. William and his brother, Elijah Madison (1840-1935) both joined the Confederate States Army on May 29, 1861. William was discharged with a disability in September, 1861; he then enlisted as a private in Company F, 36th Georgia Regiment, Infantry on April 10, 1862. He was captured at Vicksburg, Mississippi on July 4, 1863 and paroled there on July 9, 1863. Thomas, their father, joined Company E, 7th Georgia Regiment, Infantry at the age of 50 on May 19, 1863. One year later, on May 6, 1864, during the Battle of the Wilderness, Thomas was "severely wounded in the hip" by a Yankee gunshot. He suffered for weeks in the Lynchburg Hospital, then died on June 25, 1864. He is buried in the Confederate section of the Old City Cemetery in Lynchburg, Virginia.

Thomas was the son of Major Greenville Henderson (1792-1871), who was a veteran of the War of 1812, serving in Captain H. Lanis Company, Georgia Militia Regiment. Thomas' mother was Nancy Barnett Henderson. Before and during the War Between the States, Greenville owned a grist mill in DeKalb County, (Tucker), which he operated with his son, Rufus. On July 18, 1864, just weeks after his son, Thomas died from the gunshot wound and while William and Elijah were still in Virginia fighting for Lee's Army of Northern Virginia, Federal troops (Logan's 15th A.C., the Federal Army of Tennessee) camped on Greenville's land, drinking and watering their horses in the creek around the grist mill. Greenville reportedly hid gold and food supplies in kettles to prevent their confiscation by the Union troops. Union forces under the command of Logan, Garrard, and Lightburn came through Tucker and headed toward Stone Mountain along Fellowship Road. Their objective was to destroy several miles of Georgia railroad tracks at Stone Mountain. Confederate troops, commanded by General Joseph Wheeler, attempted without success to halt the Union Army. His mission accomplished, Logan withdrew his troops from Browning's Courthouse in Tucker to Henderson's Mill. The next day they joined other Federal troops near Midway Baptist Church, located at the present intersection of Braircliff and Henderson Mill Roads. From here they marched toward Decatur where they engaged in the Battle of Atlanta. The Federal Troops took food supplies, but did not destroy the mill. It eventually burned in 1911.

After General Lee surrendered on April 9, 1865, William and Elijah were mustered out of service at Malvern Hill, near the James River in Virginia. They then had the difficult task of walking back to Georgia. Once they returned to DeKalb County, Elijah and his family moved to Byers, Texas and William moved to Habersham County, where on December 1, 1867, he married Julia Anne Biggers (1846-1910), daughter of Benjamin T. and Naomi Biggers. They had four children: Emma, Phanettia Callie, Dawson Adams and James. (Phanettia Callie married Robert Lee Loudermilk in 1894 and they built the Loudermilk Boarding House in Cornelia in 1908).

William Greenville Henderson died from appendicitis at the age of 55 on March 23, 1893. Three days later, on March 26, he was buried at Ebenezer United Methodist Church Cemetery in Hollywood, Georgia. On this same day, 102 years later, a headstone and iron cross dedication was presented by the Habersham Chapter #1237, United Daughters of the Confederacy, in tribute to his Confederate service and in memory of his life. The ceremony was attended by 23 people, including UDC members, descendants; SCV members and friends. The invocation was given by Mrs. Joni Mabe, great-great-granddaughter and UDC member. Mrs. Judy Mabe Kirby, great-great-granddaughter and UDC member, read a memorial to William Henderson. The dedication was presented by Miss Cora O'Kelley, Recorder of Crosses, Habersham Chapter #1237, UDC. The closest living descendant, Mrs. Austelle Henderson Martin, granddaughter, unveiled the marker and iron cross. Chapter President, Mrs. Ellene Gowder, read a prayer, then the benediction was given by Mrs. Velma White, Registrar, Habersham Chapter #1237, UDC. The wreaths adorning the gravesite were created by Mrs. Evelyn Mabe and Mrs. Frances Chatham, great-granddaughters and UDC members. At the close of the program, Mr. John Reepe, Mr. Mike McClain and Mr. Kenneth Voyles, members of the Currahee Rangers Camp #935, Sons of Confederate Veterans, fired a gun salute.

Other descendants of William Greenville Henderson attending the ceremony were: Mrs. Martha Jo Henderson Lawson, granddaughter; Mrs. Juanita Loudermilk Davis and Mrs. Clara Sue Popham, great-granddaughters; Mr. Chad Kirby and Mr. Clint Kirby, great-great-great-grandsons. In all, 10 descendants, representing four generations, were present paying tribute to the memory of their Confederate ancestor.

FAMILY ORIGIN AND COAT OF ARMS

MOTTO: "Sola Virtus Nobilitat" (Virtue alone is nobility)

ARMS: Gules three piles issuing from the sinister, argent; on a chief of the second a crescent between two ermine spots sable.

CREST: A hand proper holding a star.

This ancient Scottish clan was sometimes known as Mackendrick or MacHerry and claims descent from Nechtan, King of the Picts who lived during the 8th century.

Many members of this old and distinguished family participated in the Danish and French wars. Alexander Henderson of Scotland is considered the second founder of the Reform Church.

Among the earliest settlers bearing this name were three brothers, John, James and Samuel Henderson who established their home in Augusta County, Virginia about 1740 where their descendants still reside.

Persons bearing this old family name have contributed greatly in the development of this country. Richard Henderson, son of Samuel Henderson, was instrumental along with Daniel Boone in the purchase of Kentucky from the Indians.

Descendants can be justly proud of their heritage and can be found throughout our land well represented in the arts and professions as well as in the business world of today.

PEDIGREE OF FIRST GUNN TO HENRY GUNN

To Henry Gunn and his sons, according to Thomas Sinclair, the line runs thus:

1. Snae Koll Gunnison (the first Gunn)
2. Son of Snae Koll, name unknown
3. James de Gunn, grandson of Snae Koll Gunnison
4. Ingram de Gunn
5. Sir Donald Gunn
6. Sir James Gunn, of Ulbster
7. George Gunn (the Crowner) died 1453. The sons of George Gunn were: James, Robert, John, Alexander, William, Torquil, and Henry. The children of Henry were known as Henryson, or Henrickson gradually becoming Henderson. From him the Hendersons of Fordell descend.

On the death of Elizabeth, queen of England, in 1603, James VI of Scotland succeeded to the throne under the title of James I of England. Four years later in 1607 colonists came to Virginia from Great Britain and settled at Jamestown on the James river in Virginia. These men were loyal to their king. They named their settlement in honor of King James and the noble river was also named in his honor. Among these colonists in 1607 was Thomas Henderson. He was born in Fifeshire, Scotland. That he was a younger son of

Those epic ships of 1607, the "Susan Constant", "The Constant", and the "Godspeed" bore in their bosoms English, Scotch, Irish, and Welsh. The Henderson Manuscript records the fact that Thomas Henderson moved from Jamestown to Blue Springs. One of his sons was Richard Henderson, who married Polly Washer. The writer, Lucy Henderson Horton, is a lineal descendant of this union through Samuel Henderson (1700-1783) of Granville County, NC. Polly Washer was a daughter of Ensign Washer. They reared a family in Hanover County, Virginia, consisting of one daughter and four sons, Edward, Samuel, Nathaniel and Leonard. Their daughter married a man by the name of Travillian, who moved to South Carolina.

GENERATION I IN AMERICA JAMESTOWN 1607

1. Thomas Henderson, born in Scotland, moved from Jamestown to Blue Springs, VA
2. Richard Henderson married Polly Washer and lived in Hanover County, VA reared 4 sons, 1 daughter
3. Nathaniel Henderson, born about 1700 in Hanover County, VA settled in York County (then known as Pendleton District, SC) 1740. He was the father of several children. Five sons served in the Revolutionary War.
4. Daniel Henderson (no dates obtainable) married Miss Ann Brown of York County, SC. They lived over the line of SC in the state of North Carolina as shown in the 1790 census, and his name appears on the monument to the soldiers who fought at Kings Mountain in the Revolutionary War. The Nathaniel Henderson homestead was near this mountain. Daniel Henderson was the father of several children.
5. Robert Henderson, born 1794, married Sarah Ann Bishop, 1817. Sara Ann Bishop was born in Pickens County, SC 1788 died 1863. Sara Ann's father was Nicholas Bishop, born 1760 died 1843, married Jane Dickson in 1785. Robert and his wife Sarah Ann were the parents of several children, Louis, Abner, Neely, Nicholas, and several daughters.

Greenville Henderson b 10 Nov 1792 in Greenville, SC married Nancy Barrett b 8 Nov 1790 in Morgan County, GA. They were married 14 Feb 1813. Greenville died 14 Aug 1869. Nancy died 8 Feb 1882. Both are buried in the Henderson Family Cemetery off Henderson Mill Road, Tucker, GA.

Greenville served in the military service of the United States in the War of 1812. He served in Capt. H. Lane's Georgia Militia at Madison, Morgan County, GA from on or about November 21, 1814 to on or about May 6, 1815, one hundred and sixty seven (167) days. He was honorably discharged at Mobile, AL on or about March 31, 1815. His wife Nancy received a widows pension which shows her living in Cross Keys District.

Greenville was among the first settlers in the Tucker, GA (DeKalb County) area, very early in the 1800's He developed a profitable whiskey and brandy making industry. The closest market for his products was Savannah, almost 300 miles away. Henderson constructed a grist mill and post office at the present intersection of Midvale and Henderson Roads. These stood until the turn of the twentieth century.

About 30 members of the Henderson family plus a number of their slaves lie buried in a little cemetery just off Henderson Mill Road. There are a number of other cemeteries in the Tucker, GA area which are also burial places for other Henderson family.

Mr. Henderson's domain did not escape the wrath of the Civil War. He reportedly hid gold and food supplies in kettles to prevent their confiscation by Union troops. Union forces under the command of Logan, Garnard and Lightburn came through Tucker and headed toward Stone Mountain along Fellowship Road on July 1864. Their objective was to destroy several miles of Georgia Railroad tracks at Stone Mountain. Confederate troops, commanded by General Joseph Wheeler, attempted without success to halt the troops from Brownings Courthouse (in Tucker) to Hendersons Mill on the evening of July 18. The next day they joined other Federal troops near the Midway Baptist Church, located at the present intersection of Briarcliff and Henderson Mill Roads, From here they marched toward Decatur where they engaged in the Battle of Atlanta.

Major Perry Henderson b 03 Jan 1860 d 17 May 1933 was the youngest son of Major A and Rachel M Leavell Henderson. Census records show him living in the Browning District Tucker, GA at the home of his parents through 1870. He married Emma Kate Williamson b d c 1926

The 1880 census finds him in Little Rock, AR, Johnson County, married to Emma Kate (Williamson) with a one year old son, R A Henderson (error) Correct name is William Arthur Henderson. They also have one servant, Lovelady, age 19 who works on the farm.

There is an R R Henderson with wife (shows only initials G A S) and three year old son, initials H L, There is also a mom, initials R M 65 years of age. I believe this is an older brother, Rufus R.

The story is that Major Perry went to Little Rock to homestead. In those days the government would give you land to homestead in new territory. Emma Kate got sick so they sold out and started home when William Arthur was a toddler. She got worse before they reached home so they stopped (place unknown) and a family took them in. They stayed long enough for Major Perry to start a crop but when she got better he sold his crop and two oxen and they caught the train and came home.

The 1890 census burned so the next record is 1900 and they are in Gwinnett County, 408 Cates District, Snellville, GA area. This is the area they were living in when William Arthur attended the Oak Shade School. This record also shows four more sons, Frederick B, Benjamin C, James E, and George E. (twins) This would be Uncle Fred, Uncle Cleve and Uncle Ernest,

The 1910 census shows the family to have moved to Appling County, Douglas District 1390. The record shows the four sons still at home working on the farm. One twin George E died at age 21.

All records up to this date show Major Perry as a farmer owning his own land. The 1920 census shows Major Perry and Emma Kate have moved to the town of Alma, GA (Bacon County). They live on Twelfth Street and he has a shoe repair shop in the front of the building and live in the back. The boys are all on their own by now and it is just the two of them. Records show (I have copies of land deeds etc) that Major Perry purchased a number of lots in Alma, GA as early as 1911. This while Alma, GA was still in Appling County, Bacon County was not formed until 1914, taking land from three counties.

He also purchased a cemetery lot in Rose Hill Cemetery (city cemetery) January 31, 1923. I found a record of this showing the lot number etc which is where Emma Kate is said to be buried. But I found no one who could tell me where that lot number was located in the cemetery. I walked the cemetery and found nothing. I am assuming the grave is unmarked. The only thing I know about Emma Kate at this time is her approximate date of birth sometime 1854. She died sometime between 1923 and 1926.

Major Perry came to Gwinnett County after the death of his wife about 1926, making his home with his oldest son Arthur for approximately seven years prior to his death. He is buried in the Chestnut Grove Baptist Church Cemetery.

The 1900 census shows William Arthur Henderson married to Lula (Cofield) with a son Andrew 5 days old. Correct name William Curtis) There was also an Isaac P maddox age 26 living with them possibly as a farm hand. Arthur was living in the 408 Cates District, Snellville, GA area. Lula died 26 Feb 1904 after surgery required due to childbirth. Lula and infant are buried at Chestnut Grove Baptist Church.

Arthur married Mary Emma Jacobs on 28 Oct. 1905 in a quiet ceremony at Chestnut Grove Baptist Church. They were living in the Norcross area when their first son Albert was born. They were in the Grayson, GA area in 1908 when the next son was born. The 1910 census shows them in the Bay Creek District, Gwinnett County. In 1912 Arthur carried his family by horse and wagon to Eastman, GA (Dodge County) where the next son was born in 1913. But by 1915 when their only daughter was born they were back in Gwinnett County.

I have not found a 1920 census for Arthur Henderson. So I am still connecting dots as to where he was later in life. I do know he was living just outside Grayson, GA in 1933 on what was known as the Yancey Place. This is where he lived when his father died (committed suicide) and when Sythy got married. He then moved to the only place I ever knew him to live. About half way between Lawrenceville and Grayson on property owned by Jacobs. This was in 1937 and he stayed there until Emma died in May 1944. In August of that same year he sold all his farm tools and household goods and moved in with his children.

Arthur was a farmer most of his life share cropping for other farmers. He moved his family a lot but that seems to have been the norm in those days if you did not own your farm. He did go to work as janitor of Grayson School and was there all my school years.

Grandma (Emma) died when I was eight and I don't remember a lot about her. We lived in the house with them at one time and I do remember bits and pieces. I do remember when she got sick the last time. I was visiting for a few days and she was to take Belle and I on a picnic the next day but Mom and Dad came after me. I remember crying because I was not going to get to go on the picnic. The things that remind me of her most are elephant ear plants (there were many of them down at the spring) window boxes with morning moss and lilac bushes.

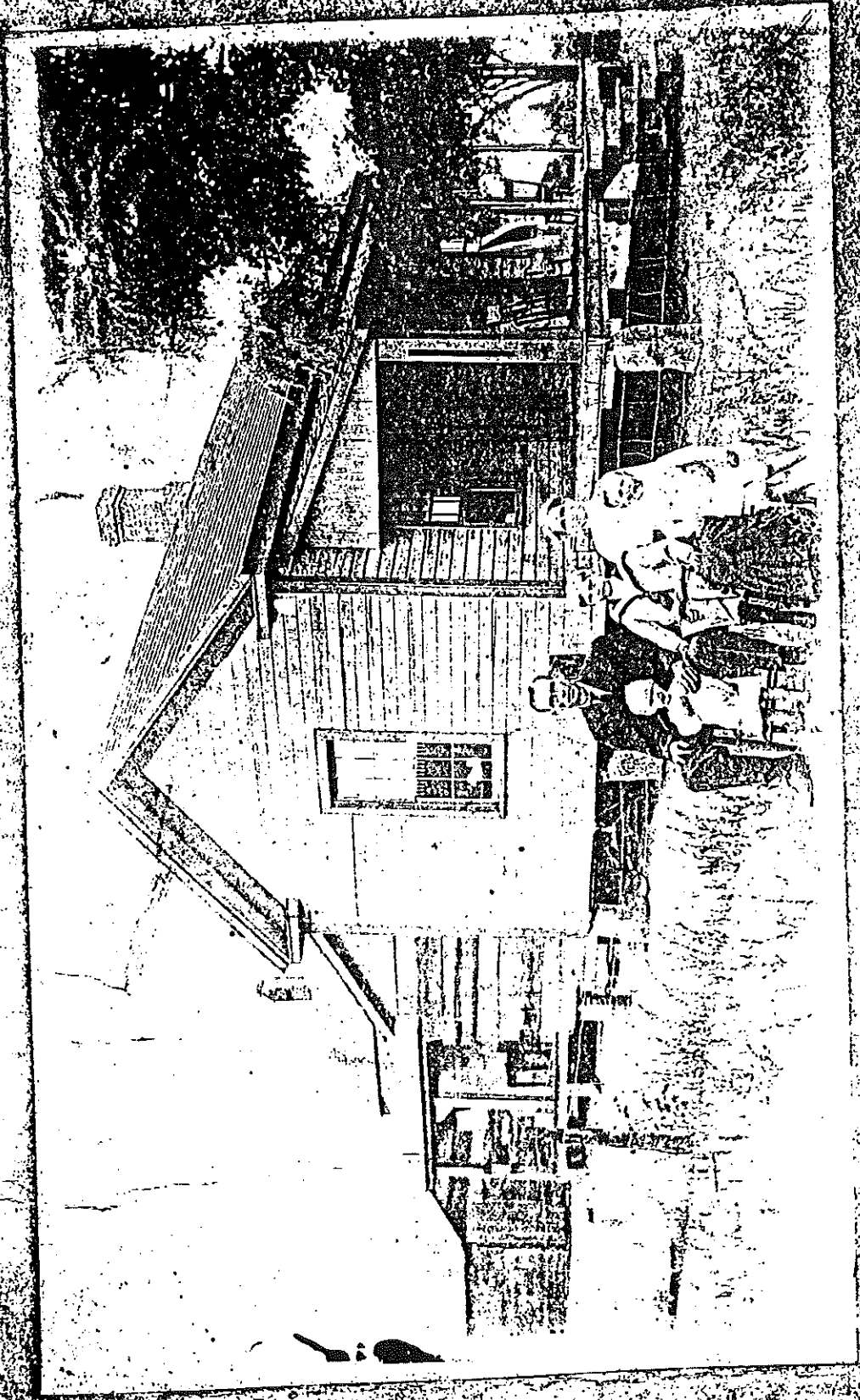

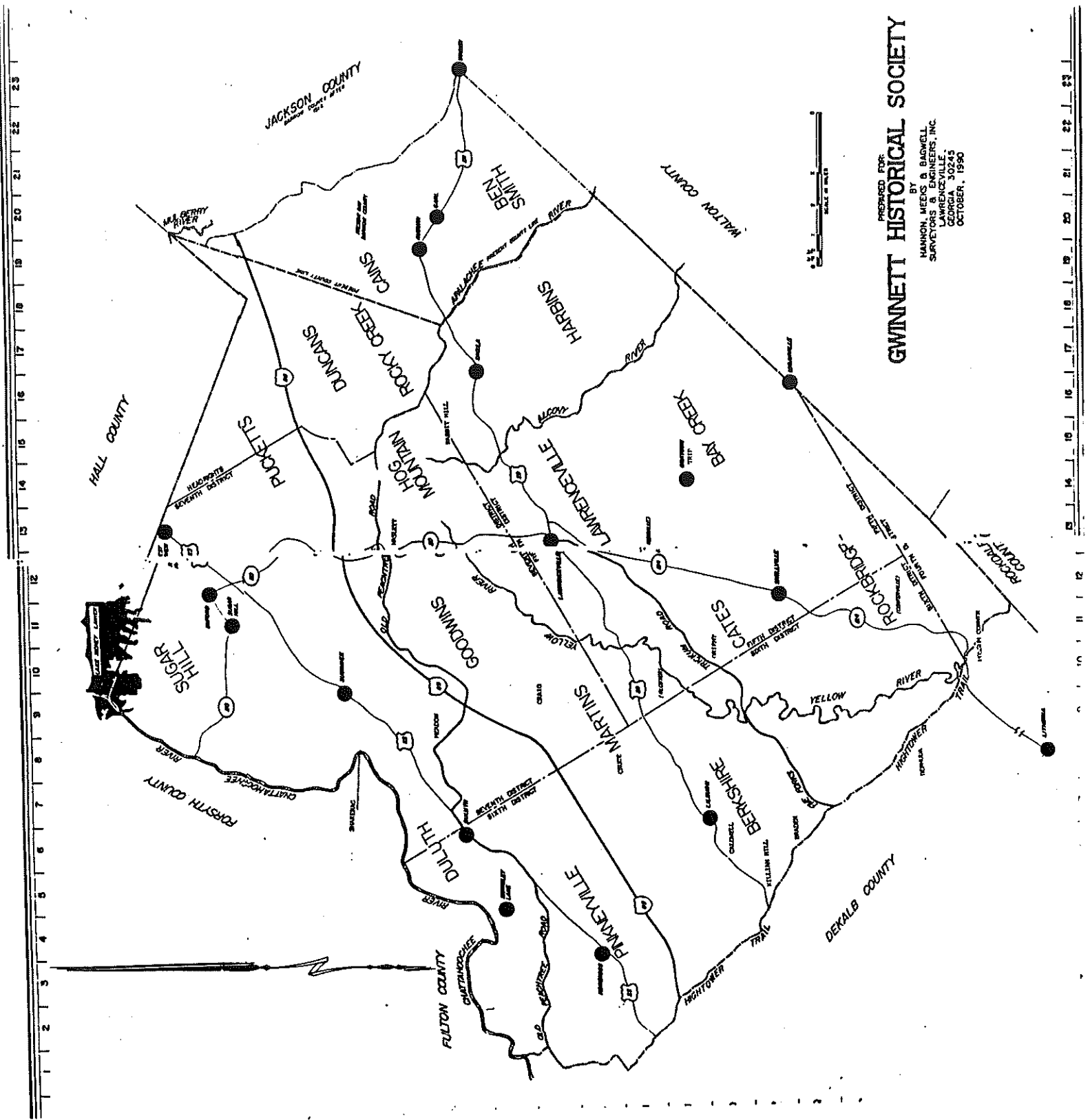
